Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Dr. William P. Stevenson House is a two-story brick, 4 bay, rectangular plan, Colonial Revival residence built in 1917 with a rear two-story ell. The house has a brick foundation, exterior end brick chimneys, gable roof of slate shingles and is of stretcher bond construction. The main entrance has an original six panel wood door with three light sidelights and a fanlight transom. Windows are six-over-six rectangular sash with original louvered shutters. On the N and S facades are one-story porches with square Doric motif columns. The porch on the N facade displays added screen panels. Doors leading to the porches are multi-light glass and frame design. At the rear facade is a two-story ell with an exterior brick chimney, attached single stall garage with a gable roof, and a one-story shed roof wing with a gable dormer.

The interior retains its original central hall floor plan with original Federal style mantles with fluting and staircase with square newel post and balusters. On the first floor are original oak pocket doors and light fixtures. No significant alterations have occurred to the interior. The house sits in a wooded area of the Maryville College campus approximately one-half mile from the southern boundary of the Maryville College Historic District.

The Dr. William P. Stevenson House is notable under criterion A for its association with the growth and development of Maryville College in the early 20th century. The house was built as a residence for Dr. William P. Stevenson in 1917 and the property was later willed to the college as a permanent home for the school's chaplains following Stevenson's death. During most of the 20th century the residence has housed the college's chaplains and their families.

The early 20th century was a time for expansion for Maryville College and much of the present appearance of the campus dates from this period. As part of its expansion program the school administration decided to create a permanent position for the college chaplain and to seek funding for a residence and office. The office of college chaplain was created in 1917 when Dr. William P. Stevenson came to the college from the pastorate of the First Presbyterian Church in Yonkers, New York. Friends of Dr. Stevenson provided funds for the purchase of the land and construction of the residence which became known as the "House in the Woods". Dr. Stevenson served as school chaplain until 1940 and died on November 4, 1944. Both he and his wife were buried in the Maryville College cemetery and in his will he bequethed his residence as a permanent home for college chaplains. The house continues to be owned by the college and is presently used as a residence for faculty. No significant alterations have occurred to the house.
