In the opinion of the surveyor, this property is located in a potential historic district (National and/or local).						
The Johnson House is one of only two cobblestone houses in the county and is significant for the unusual interpreta-						
tion of the American Foursquare Style in that building material. With the abundance of wood resources in the county, most other Foursquares are of a more traditional wood-frame construction and do not feature the distinctive porch, wall						
construction, fenestration or other Craftsman detailing of the Johnson House. Unlike other cobblestone houses from the						
period, the stones of the Johnson House form load-bearing structural walls rather than a veneer. Rudolf Johnson, the						
builder, was an individualist who later operated a nudist camp at the site.						
The Johnson House is constructed of native prairie cobblestones. The boulders are remnants of the ice sheets of the Pleistocene Ice Age which left the stones as it retreated. The house is the design of Holger Jensen, the builder's						
brother. Holger Jensen was trained at the Vancouver Deaf School and designed a number of houses in Olympia.						
Rudolf Johnson came from Denmark to the area in 1905-06 and ranched on 160 acres bordering on the Deschutes River. From 1940-1955, Johnson operated a nudist club at the house called "Cobblestone Suntanners" at what was then known as						
"Cobblestone Lodge." Johnson also published the "Sunshine Health Magazine," advocating nudism. At that time, the house						
	also had an adjoining swimming pool which has since been filled in.					

Description of Physical Appearance

The Johnson House is located at the south end of Johnson Road, approximately 12 miles southeast of Vail. Surrounded by a large fenced yard and gardens, the house is a massive T-shaped two and one-half story structure built in the Foursquare Style with Craftsman detailing of native cobblestone resting on a stone foundation. Built with load-bearing masonry construction, the foundation walls rise nine feet and measure 20 inches thick. The front wing is on a northsouth axis and an intersecting wing extends to the rear. The hipped roof is covered with wood shingles and terminates in a simple boxed cornice with wide soffit. The random-coursed battered cobblestone walls measure up to 22 inches thick and are rounded at the corners. The roof is penetrated by large hip-roofed dormers on the front (west) and side facades. which are clad with clapboards. A massive exterior chimney rises on the north wall and has an inset plaque with the date of construction. A one-story flat-roofed enclosed porch spans most of the front facade and is lit by a wide band of tall multi-paned casements. At its south end is a small recessed open porch with segmental-arched openings formed by columns resting on piers. This porch shelters the main entry door. A second-story french door opens onto the porch roof.

Fenestration is single and paired double-hung windows with multi-paned upper sash set in recessed wooden surrounds. All windows and doors are topped by segmental relieving arches of cobblestone. The dormers have bands of smaller doublehung windows with multi-paned upper sash. A small one-story porch extends from the northeast corner of the house. This porch has an arched door opening and a boarded over arched window opening. The rear of the house has round headed window openings on the second floor. The house appears to be little altered from the original on the exterior, although the second floor has suffered some deterioration, especially on the rear facade.

The property can also be described thusly: Beginning at a point 1000 feet south of the end point of improved Johnson Road, proceed 200 feet south, 200 feet east, 200 feet north, and 200 feet west to the point of beginning.
