DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Farmer's Hall is a simple, rectangular plan, two story building with a one room leanto extension in the rear of the first floor, (north side). The hall is entered on the east side through a central door with a pent hood roof, on framing principals. The large first floor space is made irregular by the presence of small rooms on the southeast and northwest corners. The north side of the building has a stair hall which runs the entire width. At the west end of the stair hall is the leanto, which contains two closets and a small room.

The stair hall has a central exterior door, in the north side of the building, which has a pent hood similar to the front door. At the ends of the stair hall are quarter turn winding stair cases, which are formed in the northeast and northwest corners of the building. The second floor consists of one large meeting room with a stove near the east wall. The exterior weather boarding has corner boards. The cornice has gable end returns in the provincial Greek Revival mode. The shallow pitched roof features a semicircular plaque on the north gable with lettering which reads, "MOUNT LAUREL 1866."

The second floor has sets of 3, full length 6 over 6 windows with 3 panel shutters, on the east, north and west sides of the building. These form bays on the respective facades. The only windows on the first floor are 2, 6 over 6 type with 2 panel shutters, which occur on the main entrance facade, (either side of the door). This gives the main facade an elegant classical articulation and proportioning.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Architectural

In addition to its agreeable proportioning and articulation, Farmer's Hall is a fine example of Local Quaker Architectural conservatism.

Its simple Greek Revival design is in sharp contract to the visual ornateness, normally associated with the late 1860's. In this it is an almost unaltered prototype which is indicative of a people, more than a style or period.

The setting is significant in view of its location, (directly across from Evesham meeting house, which dates from 1760.) It is also adjacent to the original Quaker school. (now altered) Farmer's Hall retains much of its original environment, owning to the continuing rural character of the area.

Historic

As the one time town hall, Farmer's Hall embodies much of the history and growth of the town of Mount Laurel between 1866 and 1969. That year its doors closed and the new municipal opened. In its day it served as a meeting place for the Lodge of Good Templars and the Mount Laurel Pursuing and Detection Society the town's first form of policing.

The property on which Farmer's Hall is built was donated to the township by David Parnell, one of the founders of the Farmer's Protective Club, which built the hall.



Farmers' Hall/ Old Town Hall Mount Laurel, New Jersey



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Farmers' Hall/ Old Town Hall of Mount Laurel, New Jersey, was built in 1866 by the Progressive Farmers' Club of Burlington County. The Progressive Farmers Club sponsored two annual exhibitions --- a crop show in September and a poultry show in December. A committee of sixteen men visited each member's farm during the year and put together an impartial report of their findings with particular attention to improvements and statistics. They also must have had an agricultural library, as a librarian is listed among the officers. By 1874 the club listed 85 life members and 110 in 1875. The organization also sponsored the cooperative purchasing of supplies such as coal and fertilizer.

Farmers' Hall housed other local organizations in addition to the Farmers' Club. In 1904, the building was donated to the township to serve as the Town Hall, which it did until 1969 when Mount Laurel municipal offices moved into a new complex of buildings two miles "up the road" toward Moorestown.

Since 1969, Farmers' Hall has been unoccupied. It was in danger of being demolished in 1975, but was saved by local residents. The Hall is presently leased from Mount Laurel Township by the Historical Society of Mount Laurel which is gradually restoring the building to prevent further deterioration and allowing it to be functional again.
