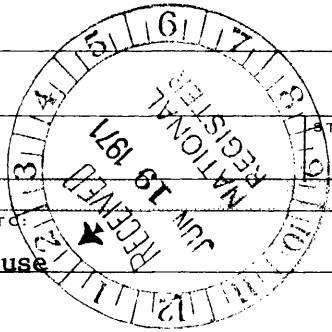

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Palladian style stuccoed building of three stories with stone quoins and string courses. Other features include a gable roof, iron grates, first floor windows and doors within recessed arches, and gable parapets with coping and raised center section. A semielliptical gable recessment contains date of construction.

Interior - brick vaulted ceiling. Downstairs hall runs length of the building and separates the jailer's quarters from prison rooms for debtors. Doors to these rooms are made of double layers of heavy plank. The hinges are about three feet in length.

The upstairs, which is entered through a heavy door at the stair landing and another at the top of the staircase, is used for prisoners. This floor has barred cages in the center, permitting free circulation of air.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Lancaster County Jail, relatively unaltered, is a significant example of Robert Mills architecture and reflects his innovative ideas on the proper construction of penal institutions.

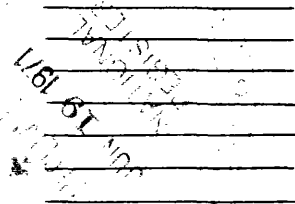
Although Mills never signed his buildings and often failed to sign his plans, the following characteristics and facts all substantiate the 1823 Lancaster County Jail to be of his design:

1. Mills advocated free circulation of air in jail construction. This was achieved in Lancaster Jail through the placing of barred cages for prisoners in the middle of a room.
2. Absence of a dungeon reflects another Mills innovation in penal reform.
3. Mills advocated that the carekeepers' apartment be placed to overlook the most important parts of the building. The apartment of Lancaster County Jail is on the first floor.
4. Classifying of prisoners according to the crime was a Mills recommendation for jail reform. In the Lancaster Jail, prison rooms for debtors were on the first floor; other cells were on the second floor.
5. Interior brick vaults, a Mills characteristic.
6. Mills was a member of the Board of Public Works for the State of South Carolina from 1820-1830. He was referred to in public documents of that period as "State Engineer and Architect" although he signed official papers exactly as other members of the Board "Acting Commissioner."
7. Charles C. Wilson in his bulletin, Robert Mills Architect, states the public buildings in South Carolina erected from 1820-1830 were, doubtless, all designed by Mills.
8. In the Courier (Charleston) February 28, 1822, an advertisement signed Robert Mills, Acting Commissioner, Board of Public Works, invites proposals for the erection of court houses at Kingstree, Newberry, Yorkville and Greenville, and jails at Union, Spartanburg, Lancaster and Yorkville.

The Lancaster County Jail remains much as originally planned and exhibits handhewn stone work. W. W. Alsobrook was the contractor.

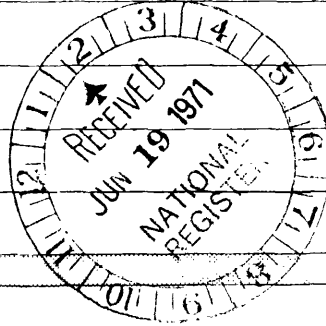
