Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The J.W. Reedy house in Beresford is significant for its associations with Colonel J.W. Reedy, an important local resident who contributed in many ways to the development of the City. As one of the largest homes in Beresford (-and the only one that could boast of having separate servants' quarters-), the building reflects the prominence of its orginal owner.

J.W. Reedy was an auctioneer who sold land in 35 states and in Canada. He owned 1,760 acres of land in the Beresford area and 50 acres within the City. Active in the Democratic Party, Colonel Reedy was President of the Beresford Town Council in 1900. He was very active in the Catholic Church (he had his own pew in St. Theresa's Catholic Church) but he also donated all of the land for churches of every faith in Beresford. Colonel Reedy helped to develop Beresford in many ways including important contributions to its schools, its churches and its public buildings. J.W. Reedy was also associated with many prominent individuals outside of the state. As a result of his friendship with F.W. Sargent, President of the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad, the C & N band came to Beresford for J.W. Reedy Day, one of three stops made in South Dakota to honor important individuals.

Replacing Colonel Reedy's first home, a 7-room frame dwelling that was the first permanent residence in the City (it was later moved about one block west), the J.W. Reedy house was constructed around 1895 on the first residential lot in Beresford. Colonel Reedy's house was considered to be one of the largest in the City and it was the only residence to have separate outbuildings for servants. Today, the house retains many of its original features including the brass fireplace in the living room, interior and exterior windows surrounds, the title floor in the bathroom, glass doors with original knobs, the open stairway with decorative newel posts, and the original overall plan of the house.

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Situated on the southwest corner of Second and Cedar Streets, the J.W. Reedy House is a frame, two-and-a-half story rectangular dwelling with a one-story kitchen ell. Two brick chimneys and three pedimented dormers project from the cross-gable roof. One of the dormers opens to a balustraded porch. Machine-made scroll brackets support the overhanging eave of the east gable. Fenestration includes three entranceways, two-story bays on the south and east facades, an arched window on the north facade, a large rectangular single-pane window with transom on the front (east) side, bulls-eye windows in the north and south pedimented gables, and several double hung rectangular windows on all four facades. The original front and side porches have been removed.

Some of the original interior features have been retained including the brass fireplace, window and door surrounds, the tile floor in the bathroom, glass doors with original knobs, the open stairway with docorative newel posts (a few of the spindles have been removed), and the original overall plan of the building. Plans to restore the J.W. Reedy House include retaining all the original features but converting the home into three large apartments. This will be done without destroying the original character or plan of the house.

A summer kitchen/carriage house is located to the west of the residence. The rectangular frame and brick building has a hip roof with a small brick chimney. Across the street from the Reedy house on the northeast corner of Second and Cedar Streets is a simple frame one-story dwelling that was used as the servants' quarters (servants' house not being nominated).
