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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Williston-West Church of Portland, designed by Francis H. Fassett and built in 1877, is a large brick complex of irregular plan in the Victorian Gothic style with denticulated cornice.

The facade faces east and is dominated by a 3-story tower, square in plan, built into the northeast corner of the building. The first story of the facade is covered by an ornate, partially enclosed 1-story porch. The second story contains a large Gothic window with simple tracery, flanked by two smaller windows. The tower itself has a pair of lancet windows in each side of its second story, while there is a larger pair in the third. The tower roof is hipped, while the roofs of the rest of the church are cross-gabled.

The north elevation is dominated by a central 3-bayed projecting wing with an ornate stained-glass window flanked by lancets below a rose window. The rear of the church, facing west, is 3 bays wide, each bay separated by attached buttresses. The most distinctive feature here is a large rose window.

A wing containing stained-glass windows on both its east and west sides runs south from the church to the parish house. The latter, built in 1905 on designs by John Calvin Stevens and John Howard Stevens, is a large 2-story building of compatible style and detail.

At the time of the construction of the parish house Stevens also added the one story porch on the east facade of the church and also, unfortunately removed some of the High Victorian Gothic ornamentation, particularly on the tower.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Although not a highly significant architectural monument, the Williston-West Church is interesting as an amalgum of the talents of Maine's most noted mid-19th century architect, Francis H. Fassett, and her most famous nationally known architect, John Calvin Stevens, who designed, respectively, the church and the parish house. In this case the original Fassett building was probably more outstanding work in its original state that it is today having been shorn of many of its Victorian ornaments by Stevens.

Of far greater significance, however, is the fact that at the Williston-West Church was founded in 1881 the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor by the Reverend Francis E. Clark (1851-1927). Beginning with a little band of neighborhood children who gathered in the church vestry for a religious meeting, the nucleus of the Christian Endeavor movement was formed which became nation-wide and eventually international in scope. Mr. Clark believed "that the young people of the world had not sufficient opportunity for religious activities, and that the way to secure for them the privileges of satisfactory Christian growth was to organize them into a body which had definite personal and religious duties."

Non-denominational in organization, the Christian Endeavor was the well-spring of the Sunday school movement which for the first time provided suitably oriented religious instruction for children. As individual demonstrations began developing their own Sunday school curricula, the size of the Christian Endeavor was reduced to some extent. There remains, nevertheless, an international membership of several hundred thousand, representatives of which will celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of the organization at the Williston-West Church in 1981.
