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SUMMERS STREET HISTORIC DISTRICT

Name: Summers Street Historic District, Kennesaw, Cobb County, Georgia

Location: Summers Street, between South Main Street and West Road.

Owner: Multiple ownership (see attached list)

Description:

The Summers Street Historic District consists of several late-nineteenth-century town residences and a single farmhouse along Summers Street between South Main Street and West Road. These houses are all located along the south-west side of Summers Street, with the exception of the farmhouse at the south-ern end of the district. The houses are modest one- and two-story frame structures with some Queen Anne, Eastlake and Craftsman detailing. They generally share a common setback line and are of a similar scale on relatively small lots. Two intrusions are present in the district -- a small brick structure used as a television-repair shop to the rear (southwest) of Lot 91, and a small frame contemporary house on the northwest half of Lot 23 [see photographs 33-36].

Significance:

The Summers Street Historic District constitutes an intact segment of another nineteenth-century wagon-road development similar to, but less extensive than, the Cherokee Street area. Included here are several in-town residences and one outlying farmhouse. In terms of transportation history, the district incorporates as its central feature a stretch of the old Cassville Road, another of the nineteenth-century wagon roads in Kennesaw. In terms of agricultural history, the district includes a fine Victorian farmhouse with an updated Craftsman-style porch standing on a prominent knoll at the historic edge of the city. In terms of architectural history, the district is significant for its remaining late-nineteenth-century residences, which include some of the most elaborately detailed in Kennesaw and represent the type of housing found in such a small northwest Georgia town. In terms of local history, the district contains two houses (Hill-Burrell House, #24, and the Hill-Rosenburg House, #84), built by the sons of prominent Civil War-era merchant John W.

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"Bacon" Hill, whose notoriously brazen dealings with Yankee occupation troops garnered him the fortune passed on to his sons, and the Butler House (#91), which still remains in the family of a prominent Big Shanty pioneer, Major Hiram Butler.

Acreage: 6 acres

Verbal Boundary Description:

The boundary of the Summers Street Historic District is identified and described by a heavy black line on the attached map of the Kennesaw multiple-resource area. This boundary encompasses an intact residential segment surviving from the old Cassville Road wagon-road development. Northeast of the district, along the other side of Summers Street, is a small modern shopping plaza. Southeast of the district is a lumberyard. South and southwest of the district is a tract of more recent, historically insignificant frame houses. West of the district is a high school and cemetery.
