DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The proposed Blountville Historic District covers the distance of Main Street or old Highway 11W running east to west through the center of town. Within this area and considered of importance to the district are 23 houses, the cemetery, the court house, and a small law office. There is a wide variety of late eighteenth century structures, most of them white clapboard, many of them log underneath, and a few of them of outstanding architectural significance. The line of early residences is occasionally interrupted by a new store building, a modernized nineteenth century structure, or a vacant lot. Most of the buildings on Main Street are on the original 30 long narrow lots which extend to a back street. Buildings have not littered the back of the lots on the north side of Main Street. They remain open with trees and grass; in some cases the buildings have disappeared and a lot is completely vacant.

The western boundary of the district is determined by the Blountville Cemetery, which contains the graves of many of the town's early leaders and citizens. Buildings on the north side of the hill include a board and batten house next to the cemetery, five clapboard houses, all probably of the last half of the nineteenth century, and one modern dwelling. Excepting one two-story mid-nineteenth century frame dwelling, early buildings on the south side have been replaced by an assortment of low modern structures including a Tennessee Highway Department maintenance complex.

In the center of town, the north side of Main Street is dominated by the two-story red brick court house, built during the 1920's and with a wing of more recent date. After the completion of a new court house to be built off Main Street, the present building will serve as an annex. There are two buildings of architectural importance on this side. The Old Deery Inn, a two-story clapboard-over-log structure, has exceptional detail both on the interior and exterior. Anderson Hall is one of the few brick dwellings in Blountville. It is a two-story dwelling with interior chimneys, a double porch, and carved doorways with fanlights surmounted by pediments. Next to Anderson Hall is a small white clapboard law office.

On the south side of Main Street are three modern church buildings, two of them in the Colonial Revival style. The oldest structure still standing in Blountville, the Col. John Anderson House, is located between two of the churches, and is across the street from the Old Deery Inn. It is a two-story clapboard-over-log house. Presently it serves as the Sullivan County Public Library, but its continued use is uncertain.

The limited number of new commercial buildings within the proposed district are west of the Old Deery Inn and the John Anderson House.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Blountville has been the county seat of Sullivan County since 1795. It was also an active commercial center through much of the nineteenth century. As such, the early residents of the town included men of outstanding legal talent and men who became wealthy merchants. With the advent of better roads and transportation, many of the lawyers, merchants, and others moved to the larger towns of Bristol and Kingsport. To the visitor, the Main Street of Blountville appears to have changed little since that time. Many of the homes associated with the early leaders from the late eighteenth century through the nineteenth century still stand with open areas of trees and grass.

The land on which Blountville is built was originally a 600 acre grant purchased by James Brigham in 1782. Ten years later, Brigham gave 30 acres to the county commissioners when Sullivan County was being partitioned to make other counties and there was a need for a centrally located court house. Thirty quarter-acre lots were offered for sale in 1795. At first, sales were slow, but eventually buyers included men like Col. John Tipton, Col. James King, William Deery, and General George Rutledge. With the addition of such prominent and well-educated families as the Rheas, Andersons, Fains, Dulaneys, and Maxwells, Blountville became the "center of an enlightened citizenship." Many of the men had outstanding military records and were to serve in the legislature, both state and national.

The Tennessee Gazetteer, published in 1834, stated that Blountville had a population of 209 in 1829, and that it contained 28 houses, one Presbyterian church, one Methodist church, one lawyer (in all probability, an inaccurate figure), one doctor, six stores, two taverns, and ten mechanics. Another source states that the town had no shipping facilities, but did have three stagelines. As early as 1806, the Jefferson Academy for boys opened. A female academy was established in 1837.

The late nineteenth century structures which remain along with the earlier buildings on Main Street suggest that the town changed to a limited extent after the Civil War. During the war, it served as the site of the Battle of Blountville.

8. Significance (cont.)

Blountville has not only maintained many of its early structures, it has also maintained the quiet way of life of a small rural town. The exceptions are busy court days when traffic is heavy, but even this continues in the tradition of Blountville as the county seat. Dwellings on the north side of Main Street have their original long narrow lots extending to the back street. With their gardens and out-buildings, the view is not much different from what it would have been during the nineteenth century. Most of the houses are simple, although there are a few, such as the architecturally significant Old Deery Inn and Anderson Hall, which are reminders of the town's more prosperous years.

Until very recently, Blountville has changed little since the late nineteenth century. Suburban developments are extending far beyond both Bristol and Kingsport. Small flat-roofed and glass-front store buildings have replaced some of the older buildings on Blountville's Main Street and others are threatened. A few individuals, like the owner of the Old Deery Inn, have consciously worked at preserving the town. To this point, however, Blountville's preservation has been primarily by happenstance; from now on, its survival will require much more.
