The Old Town Hall of Enfield is a rectangular-plan, two-story, clapboard sided frame building constructed in the Greek Revival style of architecture. It is set upon a low, brick foundation and has a medium-pitch temple style gable roof. The main(east) elevation is dominated by a full-height pedimented portico supported by four fluted Ionic columns of wood. A three-part entablature of the Classical order, constructed of wood and consisting of a moulded cornice, plain frieze, and moulded boxed architrave, surmounts the columns. A moulded and boxed raking cornice of wood appears on the pedimented end gable, and wood corner pilasters frame the main elevation. Fenestration in the main elevation consists of central double-doors on the ground floor enframed by a decorative wood frontispiece. The central entrance is flanked by two single doorways of smaller proportions which are surmounted by single transomlights and enclosed in similar frontispiece treatment. A six-over-six light double-hung sash window is centered over the main entrance in the second story. The treatment of this window suggests it is a survivor from the original plan of the 1774 meeting house and was not Greek Revivalized in the 1848 "modernizations".

The side(north and south) elevations are identical in treatment. Each elevation is sided in clapboard and divided into five bays. The entablature treatment duplicates that of the main elevation, including the design and application of the moulded wood corner pilasters. Fenestration in the side elevations are six-over-six light double-hung sash type throughout, and appear to have been neglected during the 1848 modifications. The rear(west) elevation is clapboard sided in its entirety, and includes a moulded wood raking cornice with partial cornice return. Fenestration includes two unembellished single doorways in the second floor spaced near the ends of the elevation. A companion doorway is placed slightly off-center in the ground floor. Access to these rear entranceways is provided by an iron balcony which is of 20th-century design.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Old Town Hall of Enfield was the primary locus of community life from 1775 until the 1920's. It is a landmark building and a focal point on Enfield's main street, and is a reference point in the village.

The Old Town Hall was built between 1773 and 1774 as a meeting house for the First Ecclestiastical Society. It originally occupied a site across Enfield Street from its present location. In 1848, the building was moved to its current site and set upon a low, brick foundation. The meeting house was moved to open the view of a larger church, the Fourth Congregational Meeting House, which occupied the rear of the lot. The prevalent Greek Revival treatment, added to the meeting house at the time it was moved, was an attempt to update the styling of the building in accordance with the Classical tastes of the period.

According to town records, the First Ecclestiastical Society elected to build the meeting house in May, 1772, and ordered the duplication of the plan of the meeting house at East Windsor, Connecticut. The Society selected a local craftsman, Isaac Kirby, to build the meeting house from vernacular materials and to "complete it with stepstones". Kirby began building in the summer of 1773 and finished the meeting house before New Year's Day, 1775.2 Although the Greek Revival modifications partially obscured the original work, it may be assumed that Kirby erected a relatively austere rectangular-plan frame meeting house, which in its simplicity was quite adaptable to the later treatment. Kirby's original design included a steeple and weather-cock. It is not known if these elements were removed in the 1848 work.

Although the Old Town Hall is no longer used for town meetings and offices, the building has been leased and stabilized by the Enfield Historical Society who plan to restore the building as a community center. The historical fabric of the structure is
