Architectural Description and Present Condition: Neo-classical, two-story frame house (now covered with aluminum siding). Brick chimneys and composition roof. Large central hall and stairway. Side porches, which resemble those on the Samuel H. Rumph house, were removed and second story balcony screened in. Situated on a knoll approximately two miles west of Marshallville with a commanding view. Surrounding acreage is still farmed. Good condition.

Historical Narrative: Anson Ball Slappey built this house for his daughter Alma and her husband, J. Leonard Jones. It was constructed as the main house on a commercial fruit farm. The 800 acres was originally part of an 11,000 acre land grant to Jacob Slappey (on 1/26/1826). Alma Slappey Jones was the great-granddaughter of George Hiley Slappey (Camp-Slappey House in Marshallville). In addition, the Alma Fruit Farmwas also the home, for a period in the 1930's, of Louise Frederick Hays, author of the <u>History of Macon County, Georgia</u> (1933).

SIGNIFICANCE

Areas of Significance Architecture; Agricul- Statement of Significance: ture

This house, though somewhat altered, stands as a good example of turn-of-the-century, Neoclassical architecture. The two-story portico is very "monumental," especially because of the house's siting on a knoll. The vista from Georgia Hwy 49 is impressive. Because of its close ties with the success of the commercial fruit industry, the house is also important as a link to the community's agricultural past.
