#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Extending the Georgetown Main Street Historic Commercial District is significant in that it draws in the adjacent business properties having buildings of a similar scale, design, material and function. The new boundaries would extend to the far western end of the commercial area (Water Street) and include important commercial buildings on the periphery to the north and south. The extended district would provide a cohesive, readily identifiable area grouped around the intersection of Main Street and old Main Cross (Broadway). The most important aspect would place City Hall in the National Register which, along with the Melbourne Building and the Carter-Moore Block, provides a backdrop and counterpoint to the Italianate Scott County Courthouse (itself the beneficiary of a recent roof and bell tower restoration).

Georgetown was settled in 1786 near the reliable water source of Royal Spring and the eventual formation of trade developing due to the intersection of the east/ west and north/south overland routes for settlers passing into the area. The district has seen many business ventures such as early hemp rope walks (rope manufacturing), tobacco handling, inns, taverns and hotels for travelers and visitors to the spring. The disasterous fires of 1869 and 1876 caused an unwanted urban renewal project and most of the buildings (save four earlier) date after this period. The two-story brick commercial Victorian buildings are good examples of structures from the business boom experienced after the Civil War, with business on the first floor and residential above.

City Hall was constructed in 1899 on the east end of the site of the old Mahoney-Pratt Hotel. It was designed by B. C. DeCamp and built by G. B. Glass. The building was shown in early sketches to be brick, but work was suspended in November 1899 when an uproar developed within the town as to the "ugly, dingy look" of the brick as stated by the "Georgetown Times." It was decided to re-lay the front and the square tower in cut limestone, making it one of the only buildings in town using this material. City Hall is now undergoing the first phase of an exterior restoration and weatherization program. Included is a renovation of the ground floor for office space for the City government.

The Melbourne Building, adjacent to the City Hall, was built between 1892 and 1902 on the site of the kitchen of the famed Mahoney-Pratt Hotel. Three stories high, it was built as a bar and cafe with a hotel-type rooming arrangement on the second floor. Still readable on the east wall facing City Hall is painted the advertisement "Hickey Bros. Bar & Cafe". Since sale of alcoholic drink is currently prohibited in Scott County, this sign serves as mute testimony to the role of taverns and hotels in Georgetown's history.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Georgetown, county seat of Scott County, is located fifteen miles northwest of Lexington in the Bluegrass region of Kentucky. The Main Street Commercial District (listed on the National Register in 1975) included those major commercial buildings fronting Main, abutted at its eastern extent by a residential district (listed on the National Register in 1978) and on the western end by Ely Alley. The expanded boundary includes those remaining older commercial properties adjacent to the commercial district separating the commercial core from the surrounding residential area.

The buildings in the extended district are mostly one and two-story brick, Victorian commercial buildings dating after 1876. The brick buildings feature cast iron hood molding articulated cornice lines with modillions and some arched brick openings over doors and windows. A livery stable features a brick arch large enough for a horse and wagon to pass through. Included are the only four downtown antebellum commercial buildings still standing after the fires of 1869 and 1876 which destroyed most of downtown Georgetown. There are also three radically adapted livery stables which also served as automobile garages. Apartment buildings, an old hotel for visitors of the spring, the city hall and two former taverns add interest. Three early automobile garages are

present, two of which are still occupied by the firms that built them in 1915 and 1920.

The boundaries of the district were chosen to include those structures omitted in the first district entered into the Register Feb. 24, 1975 and provide a cohesive unit that borders the Royal Spring and the residential areas that still surround the commercial district. The Court Street boundary with City Hall was inadvertantly omitted in the original nomination and is hereby corrected. The North Hamilton boundary was drawn to include buildings of unique historical as well as architectural value. The district includes 36 buildings with 5 glaring obtrusive buildings and 3 parking lots.

#### 10. VERBAL BOUNDRY DESCRIPTION

The Georgetown Main Street Commercial District is proposed to be extended to include an area of approximately seven and four tenths (7.4) acres, located in the downtown business district of Georgetown (Scott County) Kentucky, and includes the following:

All property facing West Main Street on the north side between Water Street and Broadway and on the south side between Water Street and Ely Alley.

All property facing Broadway on the west side from and including 135 North Broadway south to and including the temporary City Hall. All property facing Broadway on the east side from and including 146 South Broadway north to and including 100 S. Broadway.

All property facing Court Street on the north side from Broadway east to North Hamilton. All property facing the east side of North Court Alley.

All property facing North Hamilton on the west side from Court Street, including 111 North Hamilton, north to and including 118 North Hamilton.
