DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Rice Public Library of Kittery is a very fine example of the Romanesque Revival style, and is an ornate brick building with hipped roof, facade tower, 2 external and one internal chimneys, and granite trim. There are 2½ stories and a full basement.

The facade, which faces west, features a recessed entrance covered by a wide arch supported by paired Corinthian columns. The entrance bay projects slightly from the body of the building. In the second story of the entrance bay are three tall arched windows flanked by modified Doric pilasters. In the triangular pediment which caps the entrance bay is a hemi-circular window. To the right side of the facade is a 3-story tower with hipped roof. Fenestration differs in each story of the tower, and consists of paired arched windows in the first story, 3 rectangular windows recessed within a low arch in the second story, and 3 arched windows in the third story. Between the entrance bay and the tower is a rectangular window in each story of the facade, cupped by granite labels. To the left of the entrance bay in the first story are two rectangular windows, while in the second story are a pair of arched windows.

Separating the basement level from the first story throughout the building is a granite string-course. Between the first and second stories is a wide band of ornamental brick. In the half story on the north and south sides of the library are gabled dormer windows.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In her will dated May 18, 1867, Arabella Rice left to the Town of Kittery, of which her father was a native, \$20,000.00 for the construction of a free public library. Although she died in 1872, it was not until 1875 that a board of trustees was formed to take charge of the funds and again not until 1889, at a cost of \$18,500.00, that the building was finally erected.

Whatever the delays, the final product was an architectural gem, a well conceived, ornamental and impressive structure in the Romanesque Revival style with Queen Anne influences executed by architect Shepherd S. Woodcock of Boston whose only other known Maine commission was the Unitarian Church in Ellsworth, now gone. While other Romanesque libraries exist in Maine, all are one story with the exception of that at Skowhegan, also two stories, which is a much less distinguished structure.

Of its type and style, the Rice Public Library is by far the most outstanding building in the State of Maine.

In 1978, a landscaping project carried out by a local garden club further set off this handsome structure.
