Describe present and historic physical appearance.

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The Walter Willson House is a vernacular late-Victorian Cottage that includes elements of eastern stick style and Eastlake ornamentation. Situated on a shaded corner lot, the two-story wood building rests on a foundation of rusticated stone and poured concrete block. Steeply pitched gable roofs and a shed dormer combine to form an irregular roof line, which is highlighted by long decorative eaves. Original wooden shingles cover the roof surfaces. The front facade displays a shallow, recessed balcony set off by a decorative balustrade. A projecting bay window is flanked by a recessed porch to form the main entrance to the home. A rear gable-end entrance is protected by an overhanging eave.

Fenestration on the front facade includes single and paired sash windows with colored glass panels. Next to the front entrance is an elliptical window, also with colored glass panels. Several elongated rectangular windows with original wooden surrounds are placed irregularly on all facades.

Eastlake ornamentation provides the central focus for the house. The front gable displays bargeboard trim combined with stick work and imbricated shingles. There are tracery insets between the slim columns of the balcony that extend directly beneath the eaves. Wooden brackets support a light second-story ballustrade on the front facade. Although it requires some exterior maintenance, the decorative ornamentation and colored glass are intact and provide an excellent illustration of Eastlake ornamentation.

A modest-sized modern addition with steel siding is located on the northwest corner to the rear of the house.

A modern (non-contributing) garage is located a few yards east of the house.

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Under Criterion C of the National Register Criteria, the Walter Willson House is significant in the area of architecture, because it is a good representative of late-Victorian cottages popular in Watertown at the close of the 19th Century. Built for early resident Walter Willson in 1887 it features Eastlake and stick styles of ornamentation. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Plan, the property relates to the following historic context: IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement, D. Urban Settlement, 2. Residential living.

According to a <u>City Directory</u> Walter Willson was a collection agent. In 1887 Willson secured a building loan and constructed the house. Six years later he sold the property to Martha S. Myers in a contract for deed arrangement.

Architecturally, the house is a vernacular adaptation of popular Victorian themes exemplified in the cottage form. It is particularly fine example of local ornamentation as popularized by Charles Eastlake.

The period of significance for the nominated property does not extend beyond its date of construction in 1887.
