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#### **Architectural Description**

Located on an unpaved road about 4 miles southeast of Centerville, Centerville Township Bridge Number S-18 is a double span, stone arch bridge with slightly flared, sloped wing walls. This bridge crosses an unnamed creek. The walls of the culvert sit approximately 30 inches above the road grade. The arches measure 4 feet. The head wall is raised approximately one foot above the arch. The wingwalls are in proportion to the size of the bridge. The rubble masonry is heavily mortared, split fieldstone, composed mostly of granite and gneiss. Matched for color, shape, and size, the ring stones measure approximately 7 inches in width and 16 inches in height. Located on the wingwalls, between each of the arches, is a small concrete plaque with 1938 engraved in the concrete.

#### **Statement of Significance**

Centerville Township Bridge Number S-18 is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places as part of the "Historic Stone Arch Culverts in Turner County South Dakota, 1934-1942 " Multiple Property Nomination. It is related to the historic context of "Historic Bridges in South Dakota, 1893-1942" and "Federal Relief Construction in South Dakota, 1929-1941" and is classified with the associated property type for masonry arch bridges. This bridge is individually eligible for the National Register under Criterion A for its association with the New Deal bridge construction projects of Turner County. It is also eligible under Criterion C as a representative example of a stone arch bridge. The bridge retains excellent integrity.

Bridge construction in South Dakota resumed in the mid-1930s under President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal programs. Almost immediately after Roosevelt took office in early 1933, Congress began passing legislation to implement his recommended relief measures, and by September of that year, federal officials were meeting in Pierre to plan highway projects for South Dakota to be undertaken with federal assistance. In general, the federal agencies paid for labor, while the state or local highway departments paid for supervision, engineering, and materials. The intent was to put as many men to work as possible with minimal investment on the part of the financially strapped local governments.

Federal assistance during the New Deal Era also went directly to the counties in the form of relief assistance, in which the counties generated works projects for people who were out of work. This money no doubt found its way to local bridge projects throughout the state, but the legacy surviving

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in Turner County stands out. Because of the availability of good building stone and skilled masons in the county, relief organizers employed crews under the direction of a bridge foreman to build stone arch bridges to replace old wood structures. The bridge designs were based on standard State Highway Commission designs and Turner County Highway Superintendent input.

The use of stone and subsidized labor allowed Turner County to build bridges at one-fourth the cost of comparable steel or concrete structures. Reportedly, the use of stone had the added advantage of providing less tedious work for the relief workers than building conventional bridges. Between July 1934 and September 1936, Turner County built 65 stone bridges and continued to build them through the end of the New Deal era.

Centerville Township Bridge Number S-18 was constructed in 1938, and is one of 180 stone arch bridges built during the period, surviving in Turner County. It is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A for its association with the WPA. It is also eligible under Criterion C for its distinctive engineering design.

#### **Verbal Boundary Description**

The nominated property consists of a rectangle, 31 feet wide by 29 feet long, whose vertices coincide with the outside corners of the bridge abutments at each end of the bridge and includes only the bridge superstructure and substructure.

## **Boundary Justification**

Because the bridge is located on a public road, there are no legal boundary lines for the ends of the bridge. Therefore, these boundaries are drawn to encompass only the superstructure and substructure of the bridge itself.
