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The former Puunene School at present serves as a county educational resource center and sits in the midst of sugar fields. When the two story concrete building was constructed in 1922, it was in the heart of a thriving plantation community.

The school is entered by a short flight of steps which lead to a small portico supported by two free standing Tuscan columns. The large bays of all the elevations are divided by pilasters. The corner pilaster wraps around the facade to the side elevation. The front facade rhythm is A/A/B/C/B/A/A. The A bays have three double windows per floor. The B bay has two narrow ones. The C bay corresponds to the portico. Above the portico are four narrow windows.

In 1922, the new \$60,000 school replaced a series of wooden buildings, located further makai from the present school building. The concrete structure had nineteen classrooms located on two floors, as well as two school offices. It was also noted at the time of its construction that it was to contain two indoor lavatories. The rooms are arranged on either side of a central corridor. From the portico one enters an entry lobby which has doors to the offices on either side and contains a centrally placed staircase. The staircase rises almost its full height before dividing at right angles into two separate stairs opening on to the second story corridor. The original room configurations have been altered; several partitions have been removed to allow for greater open spaces. Many of the classrooms originally had large wooden folding doors between them which allowed for joining of rooms for assemblies. All of these wooden doors have been removed. The original five panel classroom doors remain. The classrooms all had clerestory ventilation opening onto the hallway.

All of the original windows have been removed and replaced with jalousies. A concrete fire stair has been added to both ends of the building, partially obscuring the exterior pilasters.

Located on the school grounds are a number of wood buildings which are not included in the nomination. Directly behind the school is a shed with multiple drinking fountains over a trough, a feature commonly found at older schools.

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The Puunene School is significant as a surviving architectural school type and for its role in the history of education in Maui.

The 1922 concrete construction building replaced the earlier Puunene school which had been housed in a series of wooden buildings. The ten acre site for the new school was donated by Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company. In June of 1922, the contract for construction was awarded to E.C. Mellor, with \$60,000 allocated for the building's construction. Newspaper accounts indicate that a county engineer prepared the floor plans and designed the "plain and utilitarian" exterior.


The Puunene area was growing rapidly in the first quarter of the century. According to a newspaper account of 1913, the old school at Puunene housed 350 students in four rooms. After the new school was built, enrollment continued to grow and Puunene became the largest elementary school on Maui with an enrollment of about 1000 students in grades one through eight from nearby communities.

In the 1950s the Puunene area went into decline as many families moved to Kahului. With the decrease in resident students, other educational functions were transferred to Punnene. In the 1950s and 1960s classes for the moderately retarded and emotionally handicapped students were housed on the Puunene campus. In 1979, the number of pupils had declined significantly; the K-6 enrollment numbered 67, and special education classes had 49 students. With the continuing decline in student numbers, the school assumed a new role as a Depatment of Education resource center.
