

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All of the nominated properties are connected with the commercial development of Layerne when the M.K. and T. Railroad built a branch line through the county in 1912. These properties are located within the central business district of Laverne which only radiates two blocks in each direction from the intersection of Main and Broadway. The central business district serves Laverne's population of 1,400 and the farmers in the surrounding area in the western part of Harper County. Locations and physical relationship of the nominated properties are shown on the sketch map. All of the properties were constructed during the first six years of the town's existence (1912-1918) the period when the character of the business district was established. Each of the structures reflect the plains commercial styling prevalent in the early twentieth century and the speed of construction in the use of austere and functional designs, prefabricated materials, use of one to two stories, and the multipurpose nature of the buildings. The austere appearance of these structures matches the appearance of the surrounding landscape, a semi-arid, flat, agricultural region.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

These buildings are significant because they represent the town building and development of Laverne, an example of the continuation of settlement and town building in the early twentieth century, after most of the United States and Oklahoma had been settled. Even after Oklahoma statehood in 1907, town building and settlement continued as is exemplified in 1912 by the speedy establishment of Laverne as the station for the new rail line that came through Harper County, a predominantly agricultural By 1918, the basic character of the central business district of Laverne had area. taken shape. Laverne is typical of rural, agricultural communities in western Oklahoma that are characterized by stability, isolation and continuity of the population. This resulted in very slow changes in the business community and few opportunities for luxuries, such as fast food chains, theatres, or recreational centers.

In late 1911, Frank Kell, hearing of the construction of the branch line of the M.K. and T. Railway, platted, divided, and sold lots from his homestead as the new town of Laverne. By the spring of 1912, the railroad, known as the Wichita Falls and North Western Branch, was in service to Laverne and numerous businesses had already located in the new townsite designed to serve the surrounding agricultural area. By July, 1912, passenger service had opened to Laverne and the railroad could now bring more settlers as well as supplies. By the end of 1913, numerous businesses had begun construction on permanent buildings for the forty-four establishments already in town and the newspaper ran advertisements for at least two banks, a general store, two hardware stores, a meat market, three lumberyards, two rooming houses, a garage (for the very few automobiles in the area), a pool hall, two hotels, a grain dealership, three doctors, a pharmacy, a livery stable, a fruit produce exchange, a barber, at least one restaurant, and two churches.

Today the population has stablized at approximately 1400, the second largest town in the county, and although some buildings have been destroyed by storms or replaced with more modern facades, the small community still retains many of the first buildings that were central to Laverne's commercial development. These include: 1) the central portion of the business district, Laverne's North Main Street District; 2) the old Sharp Lumberyard, now the Home Lumber Company, 3) the old M.K. and T. Depot, now the Riggs Mud and Chemical Office; 4) the Clover Hotel, the first hotel in Laverne; and 5) the Fox Hotel, another early hotel already listed on the National Register of Historic Places. All of these structures were built in Laverne between 1912 and 1918 and most were in existence by 1913.

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The quick development of the town is evidenced by the construction techniques and styles of simple, functional, Plains Commercial facades. Many wooden structures still survive today. Since the town has remained isolated and relatively small, these early structures have not been replaced or modernized to the extent that other communities have witnessed, providing a rare glimpse of some of the characteristic features of a new, turn-of-the-century agricultural community on the Great Plains: a depot, hotels, a lumberyard, and a variety of small, austere but functional wooden false front or brick businesses.
