DESCRIPTION

The Haxby House meets the registration requirements for the "Private Residences in Marble, Colorado" property type as specified in the Multiple Property Documentation Form "Historic Resources of Marble, Colorado and Vicinity." The house displays the characteristics of the property type described in the form, including a front gable roof, weatherboard siding, double hung windows, simple wooden window and door surrounds, turned porch supports, and decorative shingling.

The Haxby House is a one-and-a-half story, wood frame, simplified Queen Anne residence located on the corner of Silver and First streets in Marble. The front gable roof with its overhanging rake and eaves is covered with a metal roof. The house has a stone foundation, clapboard siding with corner boards, and decorative shingles in the gable ends. A shed roof addition runs almost the entire length of the west elevation. The clapboard is painted yellow; the trim is painted brown; and the fishscale and diamond shingles in the gable ends are painted various shades of darker yellow. The majority of the windows in the house are double hung, wood frame with simple surrounds and one-over-one lights.

The house faces south and wooden steps and a wooden platform lead to the offset front entrance that is covered with a gable roof supported by turned posts. Adjacent to the porch is a large window and there are two, tall narrow windows on the upper level. The east elevation contains a large window and a beveled bay window. Directly under the eaves are two long, narrow windows. While at first glance these windows appear to be more recent sliders, they are present in historic photographs and are believed to be similar to the tall narrow windows found on the south and north elevations only laid on their sides. Two windows of the same configuration also appear under the eaves of the west elevation. The rear (north) elevation contains a tall narrow window and a glazed and paneled door with a concrete stoop; in the upper level are two tall, narrow windows.

The west elevation contained a small shed roof addition towards the rear that adjoined the kitchen and was used as a pantry. It did not appear to be part of the original structure as it did not share the foundation, but did have the same exterior finish and is present on early Sanborn maps. This addition was removed in the summer of 1995 and a longer one was constructed. The new addition maintains the same shed roof and clapboard siding as the historic one and its impact on the integrity of the house is minimal.

DESCRIPTION (continued)

The interior remains unchanged from its original configuration but with some successive covers of wallpaper and paint. Old-timers from Marble report that this was the first house in Marble with plastered walls. Tattered linoleum on the main floor was replaced with tile. The stairway to the upper story contains turned balusters. The four small bedrooms on the second floor lead from a single hallway. All the floors are wood; ceilings and walls are covered with wallpaper. Three bedrooms have closets.

There are two outbuildings on the property. The privy has been moved several times and is no longer in use. This small, gable roof building has clapboard siding with corner boards, and like the house, is painted yellow with brown trim. The garage/shed has a rectangular plan, shed roof, shingle siding, and is also painted yellow. An item in the <u>Marble Booster</u> (cited in McCollum's book) told of Dr. Haxby having one of the first motor cars in Marble. This garage was just large enough to house it and was probably built at that time. There is a large propane gas tank next to the garage/shed. A poorly constructed shed next to, but not attached to, the garage was removed in the mid-1980s.

SIGNIFICANCE

This nomination is an addition to the "Historic Resources of Marble, Colorado and Vicinity" multiple property submission under the historic context of "Settlement and Development of the Town of Marble, Colorado, 1881-1917." Because it was 1) privately constructed within the 1881-1917 period of significance, and 2) represents its original design, workmanship, materials, and setting, the Haxby House meets the registration requirements of the "Private Residences in Marble, Colorado" property type. As it was constructed during the building boom of 1905-1917, the Haxby House is eligible to the National Register under criterion A for its association with the settlement of the town and the development of the local marble industry. The building is also eligible to the National Register under criterion C as a well-preserved representation of the town's settlement-era architecture. Like many of the town's historic private residences, the Haxby House is a front-gabled, wood frame building with clapboard siding, narrow, double hung windows, and simple door and window surrounds. The simple, one-and-half story residence has Queen Anne styling that includes decorative shingling in the gable ends and turned spindle porch supports.

SIGNIFICANCE (continued)

Although the actual construction date of the house is not known, a July 29, 1911 article in the Marble Booster mentions the Haxby House and the building is identified on a 1914 Sanborn map. The abstract of title indicates that the property was owned by H. G. Haxby from 1910 until 1940. Haxby's name appears in business directories between 1907 and 1916, where he is listed as an M.D. Haxby is believed to have been a "company doctor."


The boundary includes the land historically associated with the Haxby House.

(Not to scale)


