Describe present and historic physical appearance.

This rice mill conforms to the general description under property type "Rice Processing Facilities" and property subtype "Rice Mills and Chimneys." The exterior cypress shingles on the east and west elevations were replaced c. 1970. The shingle roofing material was replaced with a standing seam metal roof at the same time. These replacements do not impair the registration of the building. A threshing machine marked "Invincible Rice Thresher," in disrepair, is extant inside the mill.

This rice barn conforms to the general description under property type "Rice Processing Facilities" and property subtype "Rice Barns." It is located sixty feet north of the rice mill.

The agricultural features, including ricefields, canals, dikes, and trunks, conform to the general description under the property type "Agricultural Features Associated With Rice Cultivation." The features at Milldam are particularly intact, the ricefields, canals, dikes (including the remnants of a dike hand-built by slaves), and trunks having been maintained in the same locations since the antebellum period.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

This rice mill and rice barn are significant as examples of the few known extant rice processing facilities in Georgetown County; they are significant for their association with Milldam, which was one of several productive rice plantations on the Santee River. The agricultural features are exceptionally intact examples of historic ricefields and are significant for their association with Milldam, as well as portions of eight other plantations on the river. Milldam was originally part of the large holdings of Thomas Horry, member of the South Carolina House of Representatives during the American Revolution, delegate to the conventions to ratify the United States and South Carolina constitutions, and member of the South Carolina Senate after the Revolution. At Horry's death in 1820 Milldam, along with the Bluff, Campmain, Jutland, Camp Island, Wattahan, Midland, Millbrook, and Newland, all on the Santee River, went to Horry's son Elias Horry IV. The younger Horry, who was an absentee planter living in Charleston, served as President of the South Carolina Railroad. Milldam and Jutland, at his death in 1834, went to his son William B.S. Horry. In 1860 Milldam and Jutland produced 1,035,000 pounds of rice. All the Horry plantations remained in the family until after the Civil War; in 1885 Milldam, along with Newland, was bought by Arthur M. Manigault, Jr. After S.M. Ward and Company bought the tract from Manigault in 1891, the company acquired all or portions of thirteen plantations and renamed their holdings Kinloch, after Kinloch Creek. In 1912 the company sold Kinloch to the Kinloch Gun Club, of Wilmington, Delaware. The original main house of Milldam burned in 1879 and the present house dates from the ownership of the gun club, which initiated the use of the combined plantations as a hunting club and wildlife preserve.(1)
