<u>Union Monument</u> Lewis County, Kentucky

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Description The Union Monument on the courthouse lawn in Vanceburg is a 30-foot tall limestone monument that consists of three parts: the base, the pedestal and the statue. The base is comprised of cut limestone blocks that rest upon a limestone slab. It is approximately five feet tall by seven feet wide. The pedestal is very ornate, made up of eight parts. Beginning at the bottom, the pedestal has a fairly broad base which is inscribed on all four side. This is surrounded by a smaller block that is also inscribed all the way around. Upon that is the main portion of the shaft. The main portion of the shaft has three blocks of equal size, the lower of which is black, followed by one that is inscribed and the third which has friezes of cannons, swords and tents. This portion is topped with an ornate capital, with a scroll motif. Above the capitol is a slightly smaller block with a frieze of oak and laurel leaves. This is topped with a capital, an Egyptian motif. The statue is atop of this portion of the monument. The statue is of a Union soldier in a winter great coat with a cape. He is wearing a kepi hat and clasping his musket with both hands.

Statement of Significance The Union Monument on the courthouse lawn in Vanceburg meets National Register criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." This is the earliest Union monument erected in a public place and the earliest Civil War monument with a statue anywhere in the Commonwealth. The monument was erected by the citizens of Lewis County in 1884 and upon the pedestal of the monument are the names of the men from the county who were killed during the war. It also has the names of the battles in which they participated. This is an excellent example of the property type "statue" and the only one constructed of limestone.

Verbal Boundary Description - The Union Monument whose boundaries form a circle with a radius of ten feet centered on the monument located on the courthouse lawn in Vanceburg, Kentucky

Verbal Boundary Justification - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
