Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The firehouse of Engine Company 2 is located north of the downtown at the intersection of Main and Belden Streets in a commercial and residential area. The two-story firehouse, built in 1910, was designed in the Italian Renaissance Style and features an unusual beige brick-face facade (Photograph 1).

The foundation of the building is concrete, except for a brownstone foundation along the facade. The walls of the facade are beige-color brick, with projecting courses at the corners imitating quoins. Three entrance bays with metal overhead doors span the first floor level of the central projecting pavilion. At the second floor of the facade, bricks are arranged in a basketweave pattern over a row of one-over-one arched windows set in concrete panels. Historic photographs reveal that the building originally had a projecting cornice across the facade adorned with brackets and a tile pent roof (Photograph 2). It is unclear when or why this was removed.

The other walls of the building are red brick pierced by nine and six-over-one windows with brownstone lintels. Two bay windows project on the north and south elevations (Photograph 1). A shallow cornice of corbelled brickwork projects beneath a shallow hipped roof.

The interior of the building is rich in original features. The walls and ceiling of the apparatus room are covered with narrow wainscot paneling, now partially concealed by a drop ceiling. Recessed at intervals in the walls are semi-circular spaces housing the sliding poles. To the rear of the room is a row of horse-stable doors (Photograph 3), and to their left, two large doors which appear to have led to the harness room. Behind the doors are two rooms. The room to the left retains its wood flooring and a set of iron posts which stood at the ends of the horse stalls (Photograph 4). The room to the right, also the location of horse stalls, has been converted to a kitchen, and the iron posts have been removed.

The second floor retains most of its original woodwork, including window and door frames and double doors concealing the sliding poles. A drop ceiling has been added in the dormitory at the front of the building. Over the first-floor stable area is an unfinished room with a double loading door which served as the hayloft (Photograph 5).

The structure of the building is wood frame and load-bearing brick masonry.

1515 Main Street was the second firehouse built for Engine Company 2, organized when the City created the paid department in 1864. It is one of two surviving Hartford firehouses built to house both men and horses, which places it in a distinct period in the history of the city's fire service. Overall, the firehouse displays a high level of integrity and is an uncommon example of the Italian Renaissance style applied to the design of a firehouse.

Station No. 2 was designed by Russell F. Barker (1873-1961), a Hartford architect. Barker began his career without academic training and as a draftsman for Hartford architect George Keller until c. 1901. He later started his own practice and designed several buildings in the Hartford area, including five schools, between 1910 and 1930.

The firehouse retains integrity of design, materials, setting, and association. A basis on which to evaluate its significance is contained within the associated historic context, "Fire Service in Hartford, 1789-1939."

This firehouse meets the requirements for registration as outlined in the multiple property submission, "Firehouses of Hartford." While it has lost some exterior decorative details, it retains its original fenestration, layout, and massing. It also retains those features characteristic of firehouse design: large entrance bays, apparatus room, watchroom, sleeping quarters, hose-drying racks, and sliding poles and chutes. The horse-stall doors and wainscoting are additional elements typical of firehouses of its period. See multiple property form.
