Description of physical appearance & significant architectural features: (Include additions, alterations, ancillary structures, and landscaping if applicable)

The Creston Hotel (1913 addition) is a three story masonry structure with corbeled cornice, square bay's and occupies one full building lot. The city has recreated the turn-of-the-century street scape. Property line and building line are concurrent; therefore, there is no landscaping. Original building configuration is intact. Interior renovations are due to multiple tenants over the years. Some windows have been filled with masonry which does not match. Original ceilings are either damaged or removed in past years. Interior doors are not historically significant and have been damaged beyond repair or eliminated in the past thirty years. Exterior openings and glass are either damaged severly or modified. Masonry is currently in disrepair. Front elevation has new masonry (from renovation due to fire and previous renovations and alterations) which in essence damaged the original facade. This masonry closely matches the original facade.

Statement of Historical Significance:

Construction Date:

The Creston Hotel (1913 addition) is joined at the second level to the property designated as #29 on Exhibit A. This property (#29) is included within the Lower Twenty-fifth Street Historic District and because of the proximity of this 1913 addition both the District and within the Hilton Hotel Block, it is considered (see Exhibit A), that the natural choice would be to ammend the District boundaries to include this structure.

In accordance with the Lower Twenty-fifth Street Historic District, the Creston Hotel Building contributes significantly to the area. Most particularly the ethnic changes which were so obvious to Ogden after 1869 and the completion of the transcontinental railroad. The commercial style of the building so very common of that era (1869-1915) is in keeping with most of the buildings already within the designated historic district. NPS Form 10-900-a (7-81)

Due to a technical oversight in the preparation of the Lower 25th St. Historic District (Ogden, Utah) nomination, dated September 27, 1977 (and listed in the National Register on January 31, 1978), the boundary of the district has been extended to included a 1913 addition to site #29. Thus, site #29A, the Creston Hotel, was added to the district by the Utah Historic and Cultural Sites Review Committee on December 15, 1982.

The Creston Hotel addition, "contributes" to the Lower 25th St. Historic District in age, style, and use. The original boundary cut through the addition, which is actually attached to site #29. See the enclosed sketch map, as well as a Structure/Site Information Form prepared on the building. The acreage and UTM points of the district remain the same.


