Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Summary

Grandview Lookout Tree is located on a low unnamed ridge near the south rim of the Grand Canyon on the Tusayan Ranger District, Kaibab National Forest. It is within a mixed Ponderosa Pine and oak forest at an elevation of 7,240 feet. Although the tree is now a dead and standing snag, it still has many original features and is readily identifiable as a lookout tree. It retains sufficient integrity to qualify it for National Register listing under Criterion A.

Physical Description

Grandview Lookout Tree is now a dead and standing snag, about 70 feet tall and 35 inches in diameter. A platform at the top is accessed by two rows of steel spikes (lag bolts) that lead to a ca. 5 foot long wooden ladder which is attached to a hatchway. The ca. 6 foot square platform is built of milled lumber. It has deteriorated and now only the framework remains. The handrail, if there ever was one, trap door, and mapboard platform are now missing from the structure and scattered on the ground around the base of the tree. Seven guy wires extend from the tree to the ground, and a grounding spike is at the base of the tree. These features conform to a 1931 diagram detailing lightning protection (Figure 3 in the multiple property continuation sheet cover form). A wooden insulator post is on the north side of the tree at the base. Several insulators are on the ground. A telephone wire extends to the northeast from the tree. Some sheet metal is scattered about.

According to Forestry Technician Chuck Allen (personal communication 1990), this tree was alive until about 1974, when disease or lightning killed it. It is located in an isolated setting which is relatively open for a Ponderosa pine forest. Judging from stumps, this area has been logged for timber for many years.

Integrity

Although Grandview Lookout Tree is now dead and somewhat deteriorated, it is still unmistakably a lookout tree facility and retains its essential features. While not a "best example" of a lookout tree, it nevertheless is eligible for listing for its historic association. It retains integrity of location, design, feeling, association, and setting.

Summary

Grandview Lookout Tree is significant under Criterion A [36 CFR 60.6] for its association with 1) the development of forest fire prevention, detection, and contril by the USDA Forest Service between 1905 and 1940, and 2) the conservation movement and its influence on public land management from 1905 to 1940.

Historic Contexts/Background

The date of construction for Grandview Lookout Tree is presently unknown. It has similar features to the Hull Tank Lookout Tree (AR-03-07-04-868), built circa 1916 and located only about one mile to the northeast. However, it has grounding wires, which the Hull Tank Tree does not have. Grounding wires appear in a 1931 diagram for lookout trees, and could indicate a circa 1930 construction date for this tree. It is therefore possible that the Grandview tree replaced the Hull Tank tree. It is also possible that these two trees were used at the same time, to provide different viewsheds of the area. The tree was probably abandoned while it was still alive, as local sources tell us that it was alive as late as 1974. Like the Hull Tank tree, it was probably abandoned in the 1930s when steel lookout towers were built at nearby Skinner Ridge and Grandview. Only Grandview Lookout Tower, listed on the National Register, is still used today.

Although we do not know much about the history of this tree, it had an important function in the earliest fire detection network on the Kaibab National Forest. It continues to evoke a sense of the past.
