This SLR is issued to make the following substantive correction:

#### Section 8

The nomination states that the house was constructed by Edward Swan in 1853 following the destruction by fire of an earlier house (one of two built by the Swan brothers in 1852). Current documentation has established that the house was constructed in 1859 after an 1858 fire, and that it was designed by John W. Ritch, an important early New York architect.

The Society for the Preservation of Long Island Antiquites has in its archives the original specifications for the house. The additional documentation was published in the following: *Long Island Country Houses and Their Architects*, *1860-1940*, edited by Robert B. MacKay, Anthony Baker, and Carol A. Traynor (New York and London: W. W. Norton Co., 1997), p.378-379.

John Warren Ritch (1822-1899) was born in Putnam County, New York and worked for a New York architect named William Hurry for eleven years. He established his own practice in 1846 and published a series of designs under *The American Architect* 1847-1849, and republished several times during the 1850s. He was a founding member of the American Institute of Architects when that body was organized in New York in 1857. The Swan House is architecturally significant as a relatively early example of the Second Empire style that later became phenominally popular throughout the country in the years following the Civil War.

The State Historic Preservation Office was notified of this amendment.

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### 7 DESCRIPTION

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Situated between the shore of Oyster Bay Cove and a hilly rise to the east on Cove Neck, the Edward H. Swan House was built to face south overlooking a formal lawn leading to a grassy meadow. A bend in Cove Neck Road permits a full frontal view of the house, with its backdrop of towering trees, before the road swings west closer to the shore as it reaches the present entrance drive.

A rectangular structure built of double brick walls separated by an air space of nine inches, the Swan House is a substantial two and one-half story residence covered by a mansard roof of hexagonal-shaped slates. In the central of three bays on the building's south (front) elevation is the main entrance, a double door beneath a cast iron portico. The flanking bays are characterized by three-sided projecting bay windows. Fenestration, like the overall axial design, is symmetrical, characterized by round-arched windows on all stories. The dormer windows are covered with gable roofs.

On the west elevation a balustraded one-story veranda with cast iron elements extends the length of the structure. In 1919 an east wing of two stories was added to the two-story east projection already present. Another modern addition is the square three-bay belvedere built in 1920.

The interior of the Swan House is characterized by amply proportioned rooms paneled and decorated with applied wood moldings. The front (south) entrance to the house opens into a large square vestibule connecting with the wide central hall. The main staircase to the second floor is located in a rear hall. The vestibule and central hall provide access to two parlors on the west side of the house, and to the dining room on the east. In the latter room, classical motifs such as ornate Corinthian columns provide a variation from the more austere design scheme prevailing throughout the remainder of the house. The rooms on both the first and second floors contain marble mantels, some relatively plain, others arched and ornamented with garlands and cartouches.

To the southeast on the grounds of the Swan House stand several large frame barns, located along the base of a ridge. Especially noteworthy among the dependencies is a small, rectangular board-andbatten cottage situated west of the house. Its characteristic features include a roof of steeply-sloped transverse gables, edged with scalloped bargeboards, a round-arched doorway on its north side, and Tudor-arched windows on this and the remaining elevations.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built in 1853 on Oyster Bay's Cove Neck, the Edward H. Swan House expresses architecturally the social aspirations of a wealthy mercantile family at the middle of the nineteenth century. Elegantly simple in its design and substantial in its dimensions, this mansard-roofed brick residence attests to the emergence of Oyster Bay from a rural agricultural settlement to a community of fashionable country seats for the prosperous commercial entrepreneurs of the 1850's. The Swan House is among the finest Second Empire style residences to be erected on Long Island, and remains a fine, typical example of the rural retreats which figure prominently in the history of Oyster Bay and the North Shore.

From the time of its earliest settlement in the seventeenth century through the first half of the nineteenth century, the rural community which grew up around Oyster Bay was dependent upon agricultural produce and the shellfish of nearby waters for its livelihood. By the 1840's, however, Oyster Bay was becoming attractive to a different social element, the newly prosperous merchant families of New York City, who found Oyster Bay eminently well suited as the site for their country estates. Steam vessels provided direct transportation between New York and Oyster Bay, thereby stimulating the influx to this north shore hamlet.

Just to the east of Oyster Bay lies Cove Neck, a large peninsula of land entirely owned by the Youngs family until the middle of the nineteenth century, when Benjamin L. Swan purchased several hundred acres lying between Oyster Bay Cove and Cold Spring Harbor to the east. The Swan family had amassed a considerable fortune from shipbuilding and maritime commerce in New York City, and sought a country seat befitting the family's economic and social position. The Swan tract on Cove Neck was partitioned between the sons of Benjamin L. Swan, Edward H. and Benjamin Swan. In 1852 the Swan brothers erected two nearly identical dwellings on Cove Neck at a convenient distance from the steamboat landing. The Benjamin Swan House was demolished in 1909. The present Edward H. Swan House, situated immediately to the south, is the second dwelling on its site, erected after a fire destroyed the original residence soon after its completion in 1852.

The Swan House epitomizes Oyster Bay's history as a country retreat. Modestly substantial in size, the structure possesses a certain grandeur stemming from a sense of mass uncluttered by detail. The axial design of the south or front elevation is organized simply around the slightly projecting central pavilion. The structure's height, augmented by its mansard roof, adds to the dignity deriving from ample dimension and bold lines. Within, the high ceilings, large rooms, and judicious use of detail reflect the austere elegance suggested by the exterior.

In 1888 Oyster Bay became a terminus for the Long Island Railroad, and the community grew as a result. "Sagamore Hill", Theodore Roosevelt's home on Cove Neck, made the Oyster Bay area a center of activity during his terms as governor and President. Oyster Bay experienced a substantial increase in its population after the First World War as well. Despite modern pressures upon the land, however, Cove Neck remains a wooded residential area. In its setting of tall shade trees, the Edward H. Swan House remains an architectural landmark attesting to Cove Neck's identity as a rural retreat for the wealthy merchant class of the nineteenth century. Form No. 10-300a (Rev. 10-74)
