Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

This Colonial Revival style building with Palladian and Federal influences was built in 1923. The symmetricality and formality of the building indicate the Colonial influences while the Palladian windows and dormers compliment the uprightness and strong vertical divisions typical of the Federal style.

The building is built on a rectangular plan and consists of a two-story wing in the front and one-story section on the rear half of the building. A gabled roof is located over the twostory section while the rear portion incorporates a flat roof. The building is constructed of brick with a smooth fired varigated colored brick used on the front half of the building and rough fired brick on the rear half. The brick work is contrasted by plaster pilasters and bulkhead on the front of the building.

The front wing rises to two stories in height and results in a side-facing gable roof with raised parapets articulating the upper gable faces. Three projecting dormers with six-over-six sash windows and rounded window hoods are present on the front of the upper story. An ornamental iron grate originally lined the roof ridge but has since been removed. *

The lower portion of the front facade is comprised of three bays separated by plaster pilasters with mock Corinthian capitals. The connecting frieze above the pilasters supports the "Handlebars Santa Ana Saloon" sign (not original) and a classical cornice with dentils. Each of the bays is defined by a modified Palladian enrichment; the central Palladian treatment defines the entry door while the outer bays feature the Palladian treatment as a window.

What is now a double entry (first through the facade and then through the inner alcove) was originally a single entry flush with the front facade. The newer entry has not compromised the exterior architecture. The Palladian treatment remains the same and includes a large keystoned reliever arch with an internal fanlight transom of moulded wood and a smaller mullioned glass transom. The sidelights feature etched glass while the transom above is of stained glass. Slender pilasters support the Palladian arch.

The entry alcove which is not original was made to look Victorian and features lath on the lower half of the walls and ornamental pressed tin above. The door is of moulded wood and includes an ornamental brassescutcheon and a Victorian door frame with rosettes in the corners. Half-sized sidelights with etched glass are on either side of the door. The floor below is sheathed in small tiles with "Handlebars" spelled out in black tiles against a white background.

The Palladian windows on either side of the main entry feature the identical architectural treatment as the entry except that the original sidelights have been removed. Large fixed pane windows are still present, but the full-sized sidelights are now gone. **

The west side of the building on the front half features two keystone arched windows like those on the front. While the original recessed panes are still present one of the windows has had an outer wire glass pane added and the other has been stuccoed over. An exterior vent pipe which runs along the side of the window has also been stuccoed.

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The remaining portion of the west side features several rectangular windows at odd intervals. The windows are primarily recessed with reliever arches. Wire glass outer windows have been added here also. The east and rear sides of the building have no windows, just the brick sheathing. The added two sections on the rear of the building were built as a garage for servicing and storing the Gas Co. vehicles.

The shell of the building interior on both the first and second stories remain in their original state. The second story originally served as the employee lounge; today it is unused and empty but the interior architecture with the dormer light wells and built-in closet are still intact. The first story is also structurally intact, but much superficial Victoriana has been added. The significant original features include the wide moulded exposed wood beams and the floor to ceiling connecting posts also of moulded wood and with classical treatment. At the time that Handlebars Saloon was installed in the building, a lot of Victorian pieces were imported into the building including a bar and considerable fret work which was placed on top of, and in addition to, the original structure. These Victorian additions are not original nor are they germain to the history or style of the building.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Southern Counties Gas Co. building was constructed in 1923 for a cost of \$50,000. It was the Orange County District office and contained executive offices, a clubroom and company garage with room for 36 service vehicles. This was one of twenty-six gas company offices in Southern California.

The building was built on the site of the Santa Ana Gas and Electric Light Works which was located on the site from 1891 on and contained 10,000 cubic foot gas storage tanks. In 1911 the Southern Counties Gas Co. bought the local gas utility and operated its offices at various locations until 1923 when the company built its own office structure. The utility moved to 207 West Second from 501 North Sycamore Street.

The structure is significant primarily for its colonial revival influenced architecture. It is the only pure colonial revival commercial building in Santa Ana and appears to be the only significant colonial revival commercial building extant in Orange County. The structure was built by a Los Angeles Architectural firm, Walker and Eisen and was constructed by the Clark Bros., a Los Angeles contractor. This was unusual as local architects such as Frank Lansdown, H. Newton Thornton, Fred Eley and Horace Austin were responsible for most of the city's structures. The structures slate roof and large palladian influenced windows were unique in Santa Ana and gave the building local prominence.

The structure is unaltered on the exterior and has no irreversible alterations on the interior. The Gas Company remained at this location until the mid-1960's, when the building was bought for a restaurant in 1969. At that time the interior was augumented with extensive added victorian in a misguided historical remodeling. The structure retains its historical integrity and unique architectural presence in Santa Ana.
