Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Constructed in 1897, the Hurst (Delmonico) Hotel is a three story brick building wiht a mansard roof, situated on the east side of Main Street at the south end of the business district. The building measures 56' x 110'. It has a symmetrical facade with a "colonial style" portico. Windows on upper floors of the facade feature decorative cast hoodmolds, while those on the side and rear elevations have brick patterned hoods. A pressed metal bracketed cornice is located just below the mansard roof which originally was capped with iron cresting (non-extant). Some alterations have been made to the fist floor windows on the facade, but these changes appear to be reversible.

No architect has been identified for this building, but it is the only example of commercial Second Empire design in Maquoketa. The style and scale of the building add to its significance in the community.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Hotel Hurst is significant under criterion A as the finishing touch to the "Boom Years," and under criterion C because it is a fine example of Second Empire design.

The Delmonico Hotel Company was formed by a group of local businessmen for the express purpose of constructing a first class hotel. The growth of the city, the number of business travelers coming through, and the local need for a fine dining place, led to the decision to build. This hotel represents the last major construction which took place in Maquoketa's downtown during the "Boom Years," that period following the arrival of the railroads in 1870 and the designation as county seat in 1873. The hotel effectively closed off commercial development at the south end of Main Street, establishing the boundary of the business district.

The style and scale of this hotel both speak to the enthusiasm that was felt in the community at the time. The newspapers were full of information, and speculation, during the construction. A two column article heralded the opening of "A Hostelry of Which Our City May Well Feel Proud." Just as the Decker House had exemplied the finest in current design when it was built early in the "Boom Years" (1876/77), so the Delmonico represented the finest at the close, in 1897. The Second Empire style was considered appropriate for an elegant hotel, a "commodious and magnificent hostelry."

The hotel never lived up to original expectations financially, and in 1907 it was purchased by Alfred Hurst and the name changed. Evidently it experienced a number of problems over the years, because in 1915 it had another owner, and when the centennial edition of the newspaper was published in 1938, yet another owner. In all cases however, the articles always stressed the comfortable lounge, reading room, and

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promoted the dining room for individual meals and as the meeting place for Rotary, etc. The Hotel Hurst was definitely a hub of the community.

Architecturally the hotel is significant as a good example of Second Empire design. It must have been an architect designed building, though no information has been located to prove this. The style and scale are not what you would normally expect to find in a relatively small county seat town, even one experiencing the "boom" that Maquoketa had been going through.

The building continues in use as a hotel today, but with a number of permanent residents.
