DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The  $I_{saac}$  O. Pickering House is a towered Italinate villa with an ell plan. It is a two-story frame structure with a rough-pitched stone foundation. The square tower above the main entrance, which faces north, has pairs of arched windows in each wall. There is a one-story porch across the front which ends in a circular domed pavilion.

The east wing of the house ends in a polygonal bay. A second story porch is superimposed over the first story porch on the southeast corner of the house. A brick chimney is located slightly east and south of the center of the building. An intersecting hip roof covered with asphalt shingles caps the structure.

Paired brackets accent the cornice line. Floor length arched windows with shutters open on the front porch. Both front and rear porches have turned posts, and the front porch is ornamented with Eastlake decoration.

Inside the house a number of surviving historic features include fireplaces and mantels, a curving stairway, wainscoting, moldings, and doors.

#### Alterations

According to local tradition, Isaac Pickering built the house over a ten year period beginning in the late 1870's. From visual inspection it appears that the east wing was probably extended later and the Eastlake porch ornamentation was certainly added later.

Modern alterations include the attachment of a kitchen to the southwest corner of the house in the early twentieth century and the replacement of wooden front steps with concrete. The house was further renovated on the interior when Mr. and Mrs. Albert Fleer acquired the property in 1961.

### FATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Not only is the Pickering House important for its association with Isaac 0. Pickering, a prominent Kansas lawyer, but its design is a characteristic example of the decorative tastes and housing requirements of a well-to-do family in the late nineteenth century.

### Chronology

Pickering was a young man when he first came to the Kansas Territory in 1859. During the Civil War he served with distinction in the Ninth Kansas Cavalry, a volunteer regiment. Afterwards, Pickering was a partner in a hotel and then he tried farming for three years before returning to Olathe where he was admitted to the bar in 1872. Pickering joined the firm of John P..St. John in 1875 and also became assistant chief clerk of the Kansas House of Representatives.

About this time Pickering acquired the lot and began building the house which was to be his home for more than forty years. Pickering served as city attorney and mayor of Olathe from 1878-85. His political career was enhanced by the partnership with St. John, a popular governor of Kansas. Pickering was nominated by the Prohibition party for governor in 1892 and 1894. He was a Democrati candidate for the state Supreme Court in 1908.

The residence that Pickering built was probably as much an environment for entertaining and political discussion as a comfortable home. Since the midnineteenth century, the Italianate style had been associated by the theorists with intellectural and cultural refinement. Possibly, Pickering found this design to be congenial with his own ambitions and values.

The Pickering house was the center of a rich family life which was recalled affectionately in the <u>Olathe Mirror Centennial</u> edition. It was also "the scene of many brilliant social affairs." Besides dancing and lawn parties, "the beautiful curved stairway and spacious parlors were an ideal setting for several weddings in the family."

Isaac Pickering died in 1923, but his descendants lived in the house until 1960.
