

Significance

The Gwathmey house combines elements of the Shingle and neo-Colonial styles in a structure typical of the work of William Benjamin Wood in Anchorage. It is a more vernacular adaptation of these popular styles which were often utilized by Wood in the houses known to have been designed by him. (JF618, JF640 - National Register, December 1980).

Boundary Description

The boundary of the Gwathmey house site comprises Lot 14 in County Block 23, and contains 2.4 acres. There are no significant outbuildings.
