DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Rock County Courthouse and Jail occupy a wooded one-block site at Cedar and Luverne Streets in the central business district of Luverne, Minnesota. The counthouse is situated in the approximate center of the block. The jail building is provided with direct street access and is approximately 100 feet to the east of the courthouse.

In 1887 the contract for design of the courthouse building was awarded to T.D. Allen of Minneapolis. Allen's design prescribed a two storey Sioux Quartzite and Kasota stone structure set on a full basement. The attic is incorporated within a high combination hip/gable roof. The dominent feature of the design is the provision of the principal entry through a four-storey tower situated on the southwest corner of the building. This tower is capped by an open balustraded gazebo-like observation area with conical roof.

The courthouse is stylistically Richardsonian Romanesque. Masonry throughout the exterior is rusticated. The semi-circular arch motif is found in the colonnaded entry, several second storey windows, and large windows in the gables of the attic storey. Polychromatic highlights are created through the use of the buffcolored Kasota stone in arches, lintels, sills, strapwork, and column capitals and bases in contrast to the deep red of the Sioux Quartzite. The shafts of the three columns in the principal entry are of polished granite.

The interior of the courthouse remains relatively unaltered since its construction. The staircase, balustrades, and wainscoting is of oak; a significant number of oak desks, counters and office furnishings remain. The main staircase which links all floors of the building is incorporated within the tower and adjoining bay. Both first floor and basement is bisected by a hallway which runs through the building from north to south.

Offices of the Registrar of Deeds, Auditor, Clerk of the District Court, and Treasurer occupy the first floor; each of these offices are provided with a vault for records. The second floor is devoted to a large courtroom with auxiliary chambers for judge and jury. The courtroom has been recently redecorated and is presently in excellent condition. Original woodwork, furnishings and hardware have been retained where possible on the second floor as in the first.

The adjacent Jail building was constructed two years after the courthouse. It is constructed of Sioux Quartzite with Kasota trim in a complementary fashion to the courthouse. The rustication and the use of the semi-circular arch add further to the cohesiveness of the two buildings on the site.

The Jail is two storeys in height with attic incorporated under a low hipped roof. The southern half of the building functions as residence and office for the sheriff. Two cell blocks, including a dungeon cell in the cellar and a cell in the attic (total capacity of ten prisoners) comprise the northern half of the building. (Informant stated that floors in the cell block area were of granite, however, this fact was unascertainable at the time of the survey.)

A continuing maintenance program has aided greatly in the preservation of the architectural integrity of both the courthouse and jail buildings. Both are in excellent condition and continue to serve their original functions.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Designed and constructed during the years of 1887 through 1890 the Rock County Courthouse and Jail are significant as one of the few remaining county governmental/punitive complexes in the State of Minnesota. Both buildings draw upon local materials and craftsmanship for their design quality. The red Sioux Quartzite which forms the primary building material was quarried at Pipestone, Minnesota, about 25 miles away. The rusticated facade treatment of this material is characteristic of the Richardsonian Romanesque mode which had a substantial influence on public building design in Minnesota during the 1880s and into the 1890s. The design harmony of the two buildings is further emphasized by their placement on a prominent one-block site immediately adjacent to the central business district of Luverne.

Both the Courthouse and Jail remain essentially as designed and constructed. Both have been subjected to constant programs of maintenance and preservation and continue to serve Rock County in their original capacities.
