DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Fort Washington (no visible remains) consisted of a log stockade erected during the late summer of 1868 enclosing the 1861 Quick homestead cabin and the 1867 frame replacement structure. The fort wall stood approximately eight feet high and consisted of pairs of posts spaced one to two feet apart inserted into the ground at ten to twelve foot intervals and then filled with logs to form a wall. This heavy log stockade, enclosing the Quick dwellings and a rather large well, amounted to a total enclosure of something over an acre of land.

The existing Quick house was built by Benjamin Quick in 1885 utilizing native stone from the surrounding homestead. The house is in the Gothic tradition with Germanic influence and through its classic simplicity of design reflects a spirit of stoic elegance.

The structure is a two story dwelling, rectangular in plan and includes a rear wing and a substantial matching stone out building at it's rear. The north and east walls are of rock faced coursed cut stone, while the south and west walls are of rusticated coursed cut stone and all are set with common bond.

The shingled roof includes a center gable with wood frieze while the high end gables are without trim. Brick chimney stacks are at either end of the roof line and are of common design. The rear wing gable is offset to the right with an extension to the left main wall with the kitchen chimney centered in the extension slope. The eaves are masked with cornice fascia and the trim is forest green throughout.

The tall main story windows are double hung sash in design with cut stone lugsiles with one piece arch shaped cut stone lintels which include a simulated key stone.

The main entrance is centered on the main facade with the center gable protruding overhead on a railed balcony.

The recessed, blind door is of two panel construction and is topped with a arch shaped cut stone lintel matching the windows. The door opens onto a small portico with four diminishing, square, one piece, native stone pillars capped with redstone. These pillars support a frame balcony with an identical door opening under the center gable which, in turn, is elegantly supported by four turned wood pillars.

The upper story windows are less elongated but are of identical design and are equipped with common wood shutters.

The rectangular stone out building is identical in design to the main dwelling; it reflects total harmony with the overall architectural theme.

The yard is fenced with matching cut stone and shaded by massive cottonwoods which are clustered on the banks of West Plum Creek.

Benjamin Quick, a Douglas County 59 er, settled along West Plum Creek in 1861, building a log dwelling and beginning a successful ranching operation which gained the admiration of the other pioneers of the valley.

Mr. Quick soon set a reputation as a true civic leader by contributing to the welfare of the valley in ways such as ouilding and funding the first school from his personal resources and even paying the teacher's salary.

During the summer of 1868 marauding bands of Cheyenne and Arapahoe's began a series of raids along the Plum Creek divide; each day brought news of more settlers being terrorized and more stock being driven off. Since the organized Colorado regiments were involved in long term Indian campaigns to the east of the valley, the ranchers were left to their own defense.

Fearful for their lives, the settlers erected several forts in the areaamong them Fort Washington which was located on Quick's Homestead and became a strong point defense for the entire West Plum Creek Valley, Rifles were secured from the state and all able-bodied men formed themselves into a cavalry company with John Koontz as their Captain.

Many of the settlers had Civil War experience and therefore set up very effective scouting and patrolling procedures which did much to control the Indian trouble in the area. On at least one occasion the entire population of the valley "forted up" at Fort Washington for over two months while their homes and ranches were being raided.

Although built after the 1868 Indian Wars, the Quick mansion now standing is a fitting tribute to the man and his fort. For years it has been a show place of Douglas County and is a delightful representative of Douglas County stone architecture for the period.
