DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The River Road School was built in 1893 in the Queen Anne Style. It is a wood frame building on a brick foundation. The facade has a varying shingle pattern below the window sills which is almost a dado pattern. Above the window sills the building is clapboarded with corner boards. It has a medallioned cornice. The roof is basically hipped with a forward projecting pavillion with a gable end roof. Within the gable is a denticular cornice framing the gable. The gable also has scroll work which is typical of the Queen Anne design.

On the roof is an octagonal cupola with a conical roof, frieze and cornice. $\mathcal{X}_{\mathcal{A}} = \mathbb{R}^{3}$

The building is a basic square 30' X 30' with each side having 3 bays. It has a frontal projecting enhance with doors on each side.

During the past fifty years electric lights, a modern heating system and a telephone system has been installed. The only other alteration has been to change the entrance as the Fern Avenue side because of the heavy traffic flow on River Road.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In every developing community it does not take very long to realize the need for a schoolhouse and an education for the towns young citizens. This need was felt in Lyndhurst early in the 19th century.

In its function as a school it contributed to the growth of the town. It represents the beginnings of public school education in the community and also symbolizes one aspect of life in Lyndhurst during the 19th century.

The land for the school was deeded by Jacob Van Winkle on January 9, 1804 to the school trustees of New Barbadoes Neck, as Lyndhurst was then called.

The first schoolhouse was erected in 1804 with money raised by subscription. The cost was \$162.20. The building was used until 1849 when it was torn down and a two story frame building with cupola and bell was erected. Only the first floor was used until 1873 when the need for more space caused them to hire another teacher and equipt the second floor.

The 1849 building was used until 1893 when it was torn down and the present building was constructed. The cost of construction was \$2,541.83 including a \$70.00 architect's fee.

The River Road School is significant for two reasons: education and architecture.

As Lyndhurst's first school, the River Road School was the foundation of a system that now educates over 3,000 children in six elementary schools. In recent years the River Road School was used for special education classes. Today it is used as a second grade classroom.

Significance cont'd:

The River Road School is also significant for its architecture. Few schoolhouses survive of this period, particularly in the Queen Anne Style. It has not been altered, except to change the entrance due to traffic flows. Schoolhouses were usually constructed in a basic form to cover the simple needs of the community. River Road School shows that the townspeople, proud of its educational system wanted a building to demonstrate this pride. The fine detailing of the facade and its octagonal cupola further emphasize this point.

EDUCATION

The oldest schoolhouse in the Township of Lyndhurst, the River Road School is a representative example of the small but sturdy elementary schools erected throughout the United States late in the 19th century. With its single classroom and double vestibule for the separation of sexes upon entering, the building exemplifies educational thought at the turn of the century.

Designed purely as a functional edifice, River Road School nonetheless projects a pleasant demeanor, but cannot be categorized stylistically beyond eclecticism with its simple block form, exposed half-timber framing, and Queen Anne cupola.
