Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Nannau, a Shingle Style cottage over-looking the ocean in Bar Barbor is two stories high with a steeply pitched hipped roof. The rectangular building has smaller two-story wings extending from the east and west sides. The north elevation, facing inland, is an asymmetrical composition inspired by seventeenth century Colonial architecture. Two projecting pavillions, different in size but both with gable roofs, project from the plane of the wall on either side of the main entrance. The one on the east is ornamented with an oriel window and a second-story over-hang. The west pavillion is smaller and has diamond pane sash for the first floor. Above the main entrance is a large portico with a steeply pitched gable roof. On the west wing is a gable roof wall dormer.

The south elevation, facing the ocean, is more symmetrical with two story bay windows and a balanced fenestration. Above a large plate glass window between the two bays is a louvered fan. A small porch over this window and its flanking doors have been removed.

Extending from the southeast corner of this facade is a one-story wing. The use of multi-pane sash and chimney hoods are further evidence of the seventeenth century inspiration for this design.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

"Nannau", the distinguished summer home of David B. Ogden derives significance both from its architectural merits and from the philanthropic career of its first owner.

The house was designed by the very distinguished Boston firm of Andrews, Jaques and Rantoul who were responsible for a number of the more important Bar Harbor "cottages". "Nannau" had the distinction of being illustrated in "The Country House" of 1906 with the caption, "An excellent example of shingle work at Bar Harbor, Me." Another outstanding example of the work of this firm is the imposing chateauesque "La Rochelle" in the West Street National Register Historic District in Bar Harbor.

Mr. Ogden, a highly respected New York lawyer was one of the founders of Saint Saviour's Episcopal Church in Bar Harbor but was nationally known for his work with the American Red Cross during World War I and raising funds for Japanese Disaster Relief.
