Summary

The single-story brick Dermott Bank and Trust Company Building was constructed c. 1910 in the Classical Revival style of architecture. Located at the northwest corner of Arkansas and Iowa Streets, the bank building is in very deteriorated condition; however, a restoration financed by Intermodal Surface Transportation Enhancement Act (ISTEA) funds is scheduled to begin soon.

Elaboration

Constructed c. 1910, the single-story brick Dermott Bank and Trust Company Building was designed in the Classical Revival style by an unknown architect. The rectangular-plan building rests upon a continuous concrete foundation and is covered by an asphalt-covered sloped roof behind a parapet. There are no extant chimneys or associated outbuildings.

The front, or southern, elevation features a slightly recessed double-leaf entrance with transom flanked by two attached concrete Tuscan columns. The two fully-glazed doors, as well as all of the windows, have been vandalized and are now covered with tin. The impressive transom consisting of sixty-four triangular panes is not covered, however, and reveals several broken panes. A single-pane window with a thirty-two pane transom of the same configuration is placed to either side of the columns and completes the front elevation fenestration. Above the columns, a wide concrete frieze extends across the facade and contains four raised disks that serve as the anchor end for tension rods that are not currently utilized. A similar-sized concrete band with the inscription "Dermott Bank & Trust Co." is located above the frieze but does not extend the length of the facade. Additional ornamentation is provided by a projecting metal cornice with modillions that is located substantially below the cap of the brick parapet.

This cornice wraps around to the first bay of the eastern elevation, which is configured in the same manner as the front elevation with a group of three windows resting on concrete sills. As the center window is wider, it features a sixty-four pane transom while thirty-two pane transoms suffice for the narrower flanking windows. The actual window sash configuration is missing for all three windows. Above the transoms, the concrete frieze on the front elevation is continued and likewise contains the circular tension rod holders, which are used on this elevation. The remainder of the eastern elevation, approximately two-thirds its length, may have been a slightly later addition as the brick is of a slightly different tint. Fenestration is provided by two large window openings with concrete sills and triangular-pane transoms and a smaller one-over-one window that is adjacent to a single-leaf doorway with transom. This

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latter grouping, though also boarded over, is denoted by a substantial concrete lintel. A similar-sized window opening is located at the end of the elevation; however, it has a robust concrete sill with no lintel.

The rear elevation is blank, and the western elevation served as a common wall to a larger twostory structure that has recently been demolished. There is a single-leaf doorway opening in the center of this elevation and evidence that two windows were filled on the southern end.

Virtually nothing remains of the interior save a cast-iron vault door that is adorned with fluted Corinthian pilasters and a broken segmental-arch pediment with central urn and dentil course. Otherwise, there are portions of the decorative pressed-metal ceiling that survive despite a roof with a torrential leak. Likewise, the majority of the tongue-and-groove wooden floor has completely rotted through.

The future of this beleaguered building appears bright, however, for the current owner, the City of Dermott, recently received a \$64,000 ISTEA grant to stabilize the structure. Work is scheduled to begin this spring.

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Summary

The Dermott Bank & Trust Company Building is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance as the best example in Dermott of a Classical Revival-style commercial building.

Elaboration

Situated at the junction of two lines of the St. Louis, Iron Mountain, and Southern Railroad, Dermott was incorporated in 1890 with a population of 467. It quickly grew to be the largest town in Chicot County (population of 2,330 by 1920) with an economy centered around lumbering, agriculture, and factories producing handles, silos, and cooperage material.

The Dermott Bank & Trust Company was chartered on February 10, 1911. An October 31, 1914, report to the Bank Commissioner shows \$177,250 in assets and liabilities and lists the following bank officers: H. Thane, president; E. P. Remley, vice president; G. A. Franklin, cashier; Charles Crook, assistant cashier. The bank failed on December 12, 1921, and was placed in the hands of the bank commissioner. Its assets and liabilities were assumed by a newly organized bank, the Bank of Dermott, on January 5, 1922. This bank was closed for liquidation and sold to the Dermott State Bank on March 18, 1929. Interestingly, this bank was consolidated on the same day with the Exchange Bank & Trust Company, a contemporary of the original Dermott Bank & Trust Company having been chartered on May 25, 1910. In its final guise, the bank lasted until September 26, 1931, when it was closed for liquidation. It appears that the nominated property was used as a bank building throughout all of these reorganizations.

The Dermott Bank & Trust Company Building was later occupied as part of a building supply store and then as a warehouse for cotton gin parts. Although it is currently in an advanced state of deterioration, a \$64,000 ISTEA grant has recently been secured through the Arkansas State Highway and Transportation Department. This initial grant will be used to stabilize the structure.

Under Criterion C, the Dermott Bank & Trust Company Building is locally significant as the only extant commercial building in Dermott that exhibits the Classical Revival style of architecture.




