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7. DESCRIPTION

One-room school buildings have practically disappeared from the landscape and our memory. However, the Old Thompson School building, believed to have been built ca. 1880, is the single exception in Attala County, Mississippi. It was the sole source of elementary education in the Thompson community until 1945. Then with the consolidation of the public schools, this isolated building became obsolete. With the realization that their schoolhouse would soon be gone as all the other pioneer school facilities, former students rescued and faithfully restored the building in 1982.

Still on the original site, the Old Thompson School is located behind Harmony Church in a remote area of Attala County. It is an unpretentious vernacular building that reflects the architecture of the rural area that it served. Unpainted and devoid of any stylistic architectural details, it is a rectangular (27'2" x 22'2") frame building resting on the original native stone foundation. All four elevations are pierced by two openings: two single-leafed entrance doors (one for boys, one for girls) on the front facade and two 4/4 windows on each of the remaining elevations. A gabled roof completes the exterior appearance. The interior is a single room with an elevated (12") platform across the back for a stage or "teacher area" with a blackboard painted on the flush tongue-and-groove wall between the windows. The ceiling height is 7'9" and is covered with 3 1/2" beaded board, as are the remaining walls. The source of heat remains a wood-burning stove, similar to the ones from the historic period. It is placed in the original position, in the center of the room.

Assessment of Integrity:

Before restoration began, the building had lost a considerable amount of integrity due to neglect. The inner structure was basically sound, however, weatherboards, roof, windows and doors had to be replaced. It was also necessary to patch the interior walls and the floor but there was enough physical documentation to guide the new work on both the interior and the exterior. Some replacements are similar materials which were gathered from neighboring deserted buildings of the same period. Truly, it is with a sense of "déjà vu" when the former students return to the Old Thompson School.

The Old Thompson School retains integrity of location, design, setting, feeling, and association and is important as the only extant school building of its type and period remaining in Attala County.

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8. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Old Thompson School is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places for the important role that it played in the evolution of the educational system in Attala County, Mississippi. It is of local educational significance because from circa 1880 into the 20th century, it was the only means of receiving an elementary education within a five-mile radius of the community of Thompson. The building is a good example of a school dating to the period before the first rural school consolidations, when small one- and two-room schools were typical. The period of significance begins circa 1880, with the construction of the building, and ends in 1945, the year the school closed due to consolidation of public schools. The Old Thompson School retains integrity of location, design, setting, feeling, and association and is important as the only extant school building of its type and period out of many that were scattered throughout Attala County.

The first school in the county was established in 1838, 12 miles north of Kosciusko, the county seat. After that time many schools or "subscription schools" (supported by tuition) were established throughout the county. Finally in 1870, the public school system was legislated, providing free schooling for a minimum of four months per year for every youth between 5 and 21 years of age. However, many people were too poor to consent to additional taxation. Consequently, the private schools continued and later became public. By 1896, there were 147 public schools in Attala County; 58 of these were African-American schools. Mr. Johnny White, who was Superintendent of Education in Attala County from 1940 until 1972, stated that in 1940, there were still 104 white and black private school buildings being utilized for public schools in the county.

At best, most of these schools were inadequate by today's standards. Teacher qualifications and salaries were low; the facility was uncomfortable and the equipment was limited; sanitary conditions were poor; short school terms and irregular attendance, along with over-crowding, were just a few of the handicaps. Nevertheless, a wide range of subjects was taught which prepared children for a productive place in the twentieth century.

Thompson School and the community of Thompson were named for one of the early settlers in the area, Elisha E. Thompson (1860, 1870, 1880 Census). This eastern part of the county with no major waterways has never been densely populated. The sandy-clay soil and the hilly topography has made the land limited for agricultural use. Its

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major value was the dense timber forests which still dot the landscape. The introduction of the steam powered sawmill allowed production of lumber on a larger scale; and after the railroad came in 1882, markets became more accessible, and more people began to settle in the area.

According to local tradition, Elisha Thompson started the school in his home circa 1870. Then later, circa 1880, as the attendance increased, a building was erected a short distance from the Thompson home on land owned by P.F. Doty. However, deed records indicate that the land was not donated for a school by Doty until 1890. Grades one through eight were taught here continuously until 1945 when modern transportation and consolidation of the schools proved Thompson School to be obsolete.

After the closing of the school in 1945, the small single-room building, which has never been altered or moved from the original site, was abandoned and the property reverted to Doty's descendants until 1982. At that time former Thompson School students, some octogenarians, organized a group to rescue the building from demolition by neglect and restore it with the aid of an annual reunion every Labor Day weekend. For protection, the property along with the building, was deeded to the adjacent Harmony Church with the stipulation that "the building is not to be moved, but restored and used as a church and community center and voting house for the Thompson precinct."

Today the building is a tangible symbol of the efforts of pioneer citizens to provide an education for their children. Beginning in 1982--as adults--some of these same children have returned with pride each year to the Old Thompson School to reminisce.


