

Among the notable architectural features of this house are the paired chimney stacks flanking a central roof tower with a "widows walk", the central front cross gable topped with a finial and the paired brackets. These elements, except the chimneys are typical late 19th century decorative motifs and tend to suggest Italianate influence applied to a more traditional South Branch Valley form. The entire structure appears to have been built originally in its present configuration.

Behind the house is a frame carriage house with multiple gables. It appears to be contemporary with the house and is a contributing member of the complex. Also, on the property is a frame barn, a contributing structure, contemporary with the house.

Historically, little is known of A.V. Wilson who built the Wilson-Kuykendall House. The last Wilson to own the house, Mary Catherine Wilson Kuhn Bergdall, who died in the early 1970's, was one of the Moorefield areas best known residents. The house passed from Wilson family hands in 1973 when it was purchased by Mr. Daniel Kuykendall.

of a group of large and substantial brick farmhouses dating from the 19th century in the South Branch Valley. This building is notable for its combined stylistic influences. The plan is essentially Greek Revival, but the cross gable, windows, brackets and trim suggest Italianate and Gothic stylistic.influence. Period agricultural buildings associated with this complex are considered to be contributing members.
