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**Describe present and historic physical appearance.**

The Pete Hood House is a two-story, rectangular plan, three bay frame residence with Craftsman detailing completed in 1910. The house was originally built with weatherboard siding on the first story and wood shingles on the second story but the house received a sheathing of metal siding ca. 1980. The house has a brick foundation, gable roof of asphalt shingles, and exterior brick chimneys. On the main (southeast) facade is a one-story porch with paired square wood columns and Craftsman style capitals resting on brick piers. This porch extends on the east facade to form a porte-cochere. At the roofline are wide eaves with large rectangular wood brackets.

The main entrance has an original single light glass and frame door with two single light sidelights of beveled glass. Windows are rectangular one-over-one sash with those on the second story of the main facade displaying diamond pane upper lights. Other windows also display multi-light and diamond light sash. On the rear (northwest) facade the original second story porch has been enclosed to form a small kitchen and elevator shaft.

The interior of the house retains its original woodwork and detailing. The most significant feature is a large central staircase with square newel posts and balusters. This staircase is illuminated by a large stained glass window with floral designs. The interior retains original paneled doors, rectangular paneled wainscoting, Craftsman mantles with bracketed shelves and Craftsman light fixtures.

At the rear of the house are four outbuildings. The most significant of these is a ca. 1910 round pumphouse and water tower which is two-stories in height and is of Flemish bond brick construction. This tower has a conical roof of composition shingles, original paneled doors and six light fixed windows. (C) At the rear of the main residence is a remodeled 1910 servant's quarters residence. This building is two-stories in height, of frame construction with added metal siding, and modern doors and windows. (NC) Other outbuildings include a ca. 1910 shed roof shed with vertical board siding and two-over-two sash windows (C); and a ca. 1940, three stall frame garage (NC). The property is sited on an urban lot in a residential section of Maryville.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Pete Hood House is significant under criterion C as a notable example of the Craftsman style of the early 20th century. The house was built in 1910 and was designed with elements of this style on both the interior and exterior. Exterior detailing includes paried porch columns with Craftsman style capitals, wide eaves, leaded glass and diamond light windows. Interior detailing includes a large stained glass window, oak wainscoting, exposed ceiling beams, and large open staircase. The house is the best representative example of the Craftzman style outside of the Indiana Avenue Historic District. At the rear of the house is a two-story brick water tower which is unique in Maryville.

This property was acquired by W.P. (Pete ) Hood in the early 1900s and in 1910 a two-story frame residence was built on his lot. This residence was built with Craftsman detailing and extensive use of oak and chestnut paneling and decoration occurred on the interior. Hood also constructed a two-story servant's quarters at the rear and a two-story brick water tower. This water tower is of Flemish bond construction and is the only example of its type in the city. Hood was an official with the Knoxville and Augusta Railroad and lived in the house until 1916 when it was sold to Ben Glascock, a manager at the Alcoa plant. The property has since remained in the hands of the Glascock family. Few alterations have occurred to the house with the exception of the addition of metal siding on the exterior. Although the siding covers the original weatherboard and shingles, no other detailing has been covered or removed and the principal design and form of the house is intact.

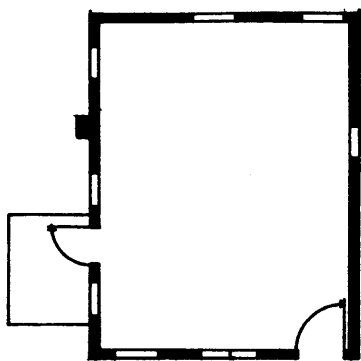

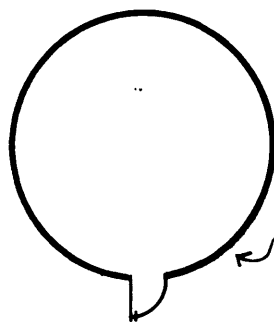

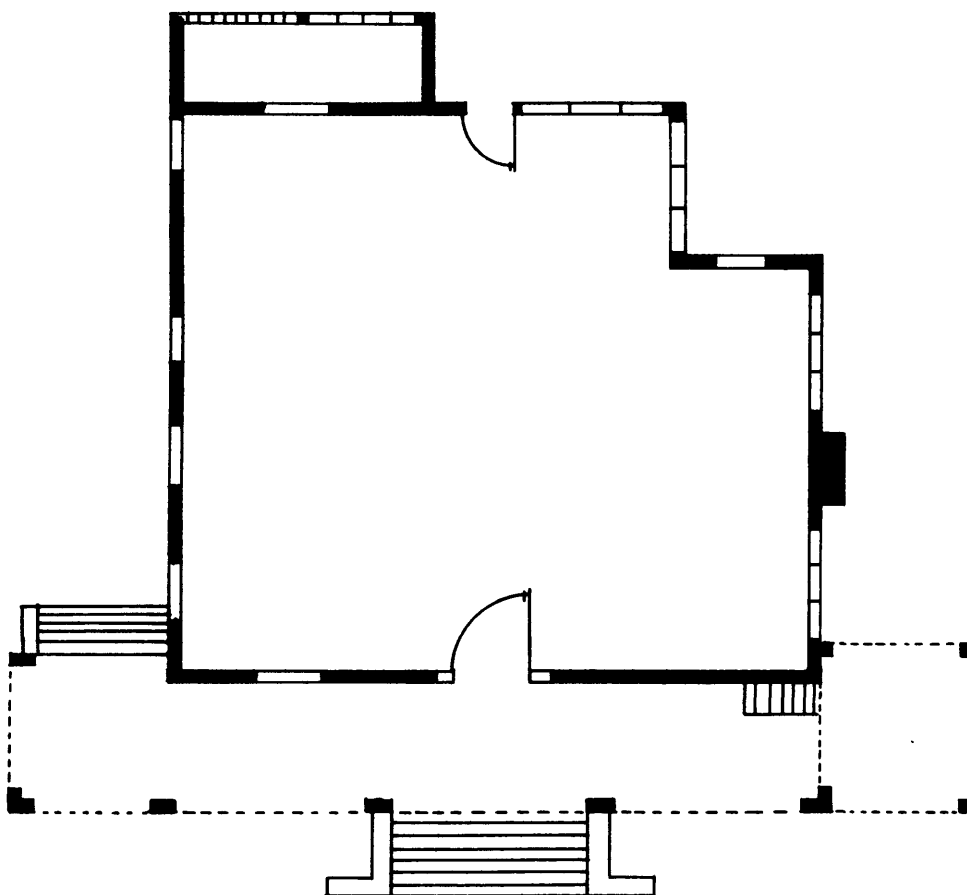


GUEST HOUSE  
(SERVANT'S QUARTERS)



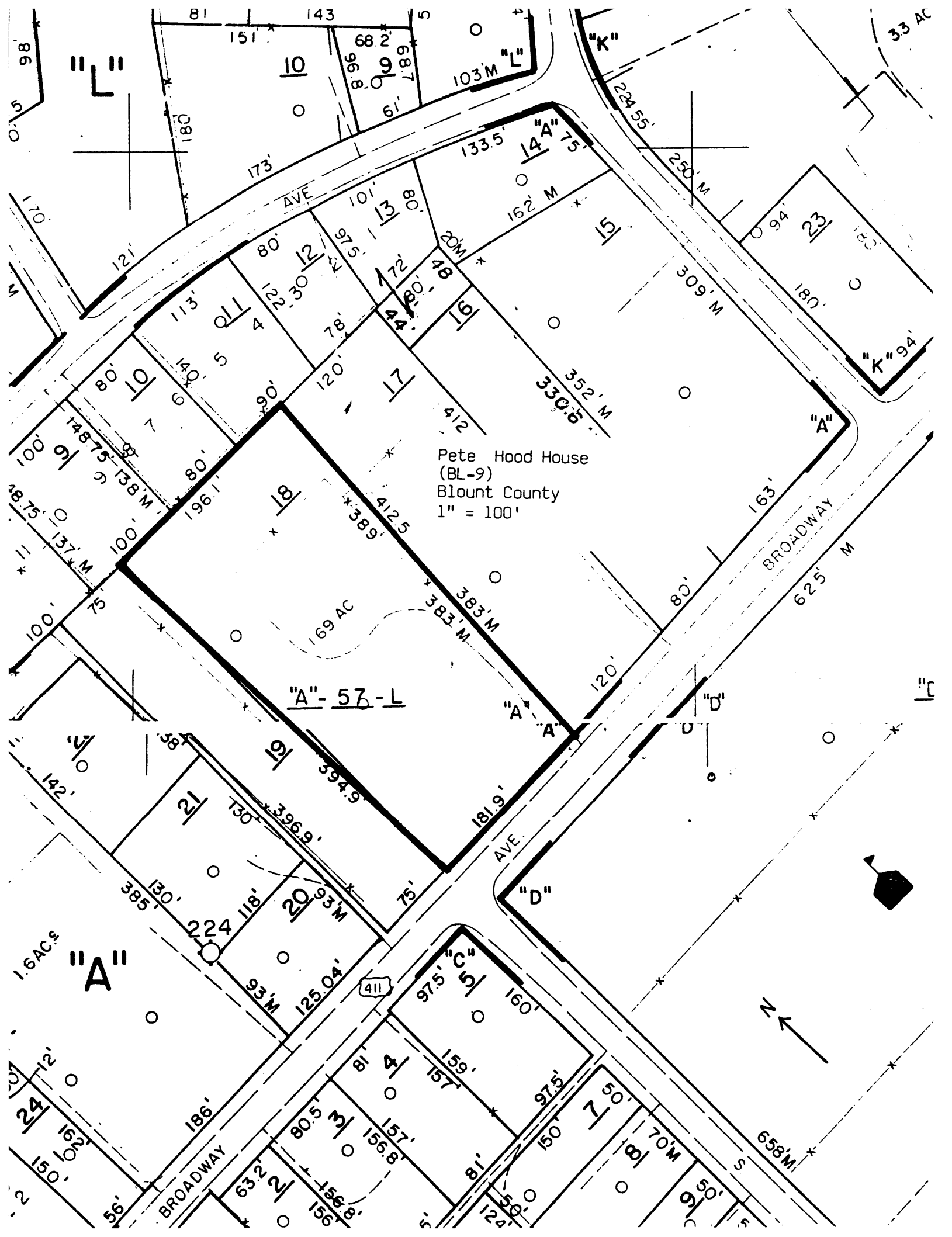
