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Description

Summary

The Rockledge Drive historic district comprises buildings associated with the development of the city of Rockledge during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The district boundaries encompass a total of 124 buildings along Rockledge Drive and Orange Avenue. There are 100 contributing buildings and 24 noncontributing ones. The contributing buildings are mainly wood frame vernacular residences, but there are representative examples of other residential architectural styles that were popular throughout the United States during the period in which they were constructed.

Present Physical Appearance

Rockledge Drive is among the most scenic historic roads in Florida. It wends some two and one-half miles in a north to south course through the community along the west bank of the Indian River (photo 1). Palm, oak, citrus, and pine trees line both sides of the narrow two lane road, adding to the natural attractiveness of the area. Some of the original seawalls and sidewalks constructed along Rockledge Drive in the 1920s are still visible (photo 2).

Collectively, the buildings along Rockledge Drive represent a high concentration of important historic and architectural resources. The district is approximately Two and a half miles long but averages just 400 feet in width. It is bounded on the east by the Indian River and on the west by the rear property lines of the buildings fronting on Rockledge Drive. It extends from the city limits of the cities of Rockledge and Cocoa on the north to Park Avenue, 2.7 miles to the south. The boundaries also include short sections of both Orange Avenue and Rockledge Avenue. The majority of the buildings in the district are single family dwellings dating from the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

The district also contains a former city hall, one commercial building, and five boathouses. The buildings along Rockledge Drive occupy lots of various sizes and shapes, but all of the structures face the river. In addition to residences, some lots contain garages or other small outbuildings, and a few feature boat docks located on the river bank on the east side of the street. Five properties have associated boathouses that are also contributing structures (photos 3 and 8). Most of the

historic buildings are in excellent condition and retain their original architectural character. Alterations to historic structures typically include the replacement of original wood siding with aluminum or vinyl and the replacement of original wood sash windows with modern metal frame varieties. The noncontributing buildings in the district are all residences or out buildings constructed after World War II.

Description of Representative Buildings in the District

Wood Frame Vernacular

Wood frame vernacular residences comprise the majority of the architectural resources within the district. Typical of the vernacular residences in the district are the houses at 587, 635, and 1101 Rockledge Drive (photos 7, 20, 21). Nearly all of the frame vernacular houses in the district were erected near the turn of the century and are notable for their plain construction, having little or no reference to known period styles. These buildings are generally two-story structures having steeply pitched, cross gable roofs and each rest upon masonry pier foundations. Every residence features either a porch or veranda supported by posts on the main facade. Houses that retain their original exterior fabric, typically combine horizontal wood siding on the exterior walls with wood shingles in the gable ends. Windows are double hung wood sashes, and most of the houses have chimneys.

Frame Vernacular Boathouses

The five contributing boathouses in the district represent distinctive functional vernacular designs. All are located along the west bank of the Indian River and are associated with contributing residences in the district. They range from one to two stories in height and have large "garage bays" designed to house boats. Typical of the boathouses is the one associated with 709 Rockledge Drive (photo 8). It has a hip roof with a deck surrounded by a balustrade. A wooden stairway leads to the roof from the bank of the river. All of the boathouses have horizontal wood siding and rest upon continuous masonry foundations.

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<u>Colonial Revival</u>

After wood frame vernacular buildings, Colonial Revival style houses represent the largest category of residential structures in the district. Two representative examples of the style in the district are those at 351 and 629 Rockledge Drive (photos 9 and 10). The Colonial Revival styling expressed by 351 Rockledge Drive is seen in the boxed eaves and end returns of the side gable roof, and the small portico supported by double Tuscan columns on the central entrance of the symmetrical main facade. The exterior fabric is weatherboard, and the windows are double hung wood sashes with 9/1 lights. A one-story bay window is found on the north elevation of the house, which was constructed in 1922

The large, two-story residence located at 629 Rockledge Drive features a low pitched pedimented gable roof with boxed eaves and a cross gable extension. The symmetrical facade is composed of single and paired double hung sash windows with 2/2 lights, which frame a central entrance that has a transom and sidelights. The exterior fabric wood drop siding and a hip roof veranda supported by square Tuscan columns embraces the main (east) facade and south elevation. The only significant alteration to the original structure has been the enclosure of the south bay of the veranda.

Mediterranean Revival

Buildings exhibiting Mediterranean Revival style were among the last added to the Rockledge Drive area during the historic period. All seven examples of the style within the district date from the Florida land boom years of the mid 1920s. Among the most impressive Mediterranean influenced residences along Rockledge Drive is the two-story house at 219 Rockledge Drive (photo 11). Constructed in 1923, it features a flat roof with a stepped parapet, two pent roofs with ceramic barrel tile surfacing, and stucco exterior wall fabric. A gable portico extends from the center of the main (east) facade and has a round arch opening supported by round columns. Fenestration consists of double hung sash windows with 4/1 lights.

The Mediterranean Revival style was also applied to the two buildings within the district that serve unique functions. The Rockledge Municipal Building is a two-story masonry structure located at 11 Orange Avenue (photo 12). Its Mediterranean Revival styling expressed by its flat roof with a gable parapet

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and stucco exterior surfacing. The windows of the front facade are rectangular, while those on the sides are set in round arch openings. The building was designed by prominent local architect Richard Rummell and was constructed in 1924. Alterations to the original structure include the enclosure of the original two bay fire engine garage and the replacement of all windows on the first floor.

The other Mediterranean Revival style building that has a unique function within the district is the one-story masonry commercial building located at 1-3 Orange Street (photo 13). Notable architectural features of the building include a flat roof with parapet and stucco exterior wall fabric. A hip roof tower with recessed round arch panels and a cantilevered overhang is located on the northeast corner of the building. A pent roof with barrel tile surfacing runs the length of the north facade. The two bay store front consists of fixed plate glass display windows and two rectangular entrances. The building has been modified by the replacement of the original storefront windows and a large one-story, flat roof addition to the southeast corner.

Queen Anne

The two examples of the Queen Anne style within the district are among the most significant historic and architectural resources in Rockledge. The H.S. Williams House at 1219 Rockledge Drive is a two and one-half story wood frame Queen Anne (photo 15). It features a cross gable roof, octagonal corner tower, and a hip roof veranda. The building is sheathed with weatherboard and wood shingles and rests on a brick foundation. It was constructed in 1880 by Hiram S. Williams, one of the founders of Rockledge. The major alteration to the building was the replacement of the original wood sash windows with aluminum awning ones.

The other Queen Anne residence is located at 621 Rockledge Drive (photo 16). Its Queen Anne styling is expressed by a steeply pitched hip roof with flared eaves, front facing cross gable extension with a faceted bay window, round corner tower with a steep conical roof, and a hip roof veranda. The house is clad with drop siding, and ornate wood shingles are found near the eaves line and gable ends. Fenestration consists of 1/1 light double hung sashes and one light single casement windows.

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Description

Constructed around 1890, the residence has retains much of its architectural integrity.

Bungalow

The Bungalow style is represented by two buildings within the district. Typical of the style is the building at 1347 Rockledge Drive (photo 17). It features a low pitched gable roof with exposed rafter ends and triangular brackets under the eaves and a gable roof entrance porch with double square columns on brick piers. The exterior fabric is wood shingle and drop siding. A polygonal bay extends from the north side of the building. Alterations to the original structure include a large two-story addition to the south side.

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Si npficance

Summary

The Rockledge Drive Historic District is significant under Criteria A and C on the local level in the areas of exploration/settlement and architecture. The district derives its primary significance from the varied architectural resources stretching along the course of scenic Rockledge Drive that reflect the early development of the city of Rockledge in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Rockledge was one of the first settlements in Brevard County and is connected with the development of tourism and the citrus industry in Florida during the period from the 1880s to the 1920s.

Statement Of Significance

Rockledge Drive is the oldest settled area of the city of Rockledge, having been developed prior to the formal incorporation of the community and preceded the establishment of platted subdivisions. Most of the buildings along the roadway are large, single family dwellings that have been advantageously sited to overlook the Indian River. The warm climate and the potential for development drew early settlers to the Rockledge area. Development of the Rockledge Drive area began after Gardner S. Hardee's purchase of the first tract of land at Rockledge in 1868. Hardee planted an orange grove and later constructed a rooming house along the banks of the river.

The residences in Rockledge reflect its period of development. Prominent in the district are wood frame vernacular and Queen Anne residences that typify the building practices and architectural taste of the late nineteenth century in Florida. The Queen Anne houses are simpler in form and are more restricted in the use of various building materials than those constructed at the same period in northern states. There is little use of stone, either native or imported, and the vocabulary of decorative details is also more restricted. The hot moist climate discouraged the use of delicate forms and elaborate constructions that were prone to decay or damage by frequent costal storms.

Wood frame vernacular houses are generally simple constructions, having little or no reference to formal styles popular during their period of construction. Some residences do make use of patterned wood shingles and decorative millwork such as turned posts and balusters, sawn brackets, and spindle bands;

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Significance

however, such minor touches were typical of American domestic architecture in the later nineteenth century.

These early buildings demonstrate the success of Rockledge as a pioneer Florida community and are a visual record of the connection of the community with the early citrus industry, tourism, and the development of the state's railroad network along the east coast circa. 1885 to 1895. Later residences, particularly the Colonial Revival, Bunglalow, and Mediterranean Revival style structures, exhibit the stability and continuity of the city after the beginning of the twentieth century and culminating in the Florida Boom period of the 1920s.

The oldest documented building in Rockledge is located in the district at 1219 Rockledge Drive (photo 11). It was constructed in 1880 by Hiram S. Williams one of the first settlers of Rockledge. A house dating from the turn of the century is the John D. Shepard House at 621 Rockledge Drive (photo 16). An architecturally significant building dating from the early twentieth century is the house at 629 Rockledge Drive (photo 10). It was constructed c. 1905 by John Derby, a local land developer and citrus grower. The residence at 653 Rockledge Drive (photo 14) is also significant for its association with the early development of Rockledge. It was constructed in the 1880s for Julia Wood.

The Rockledge Municipal Building at 11 Orange Avenue is the only building designed to serve a governmental purpose in Rockledge (photo 7). It has significance for its association with Rockledge's development during the land boom period of the mid-1920s and is important architecturally as an example of the work of prominent local architect Richard Rummell. The first discussion of the need for larger and more appropriate quarters to replace the old Town Hall at 24 Barton Avenue began in 1921 when the Town Council authorized Rummell to draw plans for the proposed structure. A lack of funds, however, forced the Council to table the project for consideration at a later date. It was not until late in 1924 that serious consideration was again given to the construction of a municipal building.

Rummell's plans for the building were revised to incorporate elements of the popular Mediterranean Revival style. Bids for the erection of the building were let in November 1924. Actual construction, however, did not begin until September of the following year when local builder and councilman W. Herbert

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Bower's bid of \$18,240 was accepted. Completed in early 1926, the Municipal Building had a two bay garage to house the town's fire engines, office space for the police department, a meeting room for the Town Council, and housed the town library. It served as the primary community building until the new City Hall on Barton Avenue was constructed in 1988.

The buildings along Rockledge Drive represent a varied and significant collection of local historic resources. The setting in which the homes were constructed and the buildings themselves have retained a high degree of integrity. The resources in the district are historically important in understanding Rockledge's past.

Begin in the city of Rockledge, south of the Rockledge/Cocoa city limits on the west shore line of the Indian River at a point parallel to the north boundary line of 219 Rockledge Drive, then run west along said line to the west line of the property, then run south along said line to the north curb line of Sutton Street, then run east along said curb line approximately 245 feet and run south along the west property lines of the buildings fronting on the west side of Rockledge Drive to the south property line of 409 Rockledge Drive, then run east along said line to the west curb line of Rockledge Drive, then run south along said curb line to a point parallel with the north property line of 515 Rockledge Drive;

then run west along said line to the west line of the property, then run south along said line to the south line of the property, then run east along said line to the west curb line of Rockledge Drive, then run south and east along said curb line to the southwest corner of the intersection with Hardee Drive, then run southwest along the southeast curb line of Hardee Drive to a point parallel with the west property line of 549 Rockledge Drive, then run south along the west property lines of the buildings fronting on the west side of Rockledge Drive to the south property line of 629 Rockledge Drive, then run at an angle southwest from the south property line of 629 Rockledge Drive to the west property line of 639 Rockledge Drive, then run south and east along said line to the south line of the property;

then run east along said line to the west curb line of Rockledge Drive, then run south and east along said curb line to a point parallel with the north property line of 653 Rockledge Drive, then run west along said line to the west line of the property, then run south along the west property lines of the buildings fronting on the west side of Rockledge Drive to the south property line of 715 Rockledge Drive, then run east along said line to the west curb line of Rockledge Drive, then run south and east along said curb line to the south curb line of Orange Avenue, then run west along said curb line to the intersection of Sharpes Drive and run south along the east curb line of Sharpes Drive to a point parallel with the south property line of 11 Orange Avenue;

then run east along the south property lines of 11, 9, and 1-3 Orange Avenue to the west curb line of Rockledge Drive, then run south and east along said curb line to the southwest corner of

the intersection with Barton Avenue, then run west along the south curb line of Barton Avenue to a point parallel with the west property line of 1101 Rockledge Drive, then run south along the west boundary of the buildings fronting on the west side of Rockledge Drive to the south property line of 1229 Rockledge Drive, then run east along said line to the west curb line of Rockledge Drive, then run south and east along said curb line to a point parallel with the north property line of 1265 Rockledge Drive, then run west along said line to the west line of the property, then run south along the west property lines of the buildings fronting on the west side of Rockledge Drive to the north curb line of Park Avenue, then run east along said curb line to the west shore line of the Indian River, then run north and west along said shore line, including in the district boundaries the historic boathouses represented on the map, and return to the point of beginning.

Boundary Justification

The above described boundaries contain all of the historic resources located on both sides of Rockledge Drive associated with the development of the community between 1880 and 1925 that are located within sufficient geographical proximity to be included within the boundaries of said district. Any resources along Rockledge Drive not contained within these boundaries will need to be addressed in the future as individually significant properties.

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
