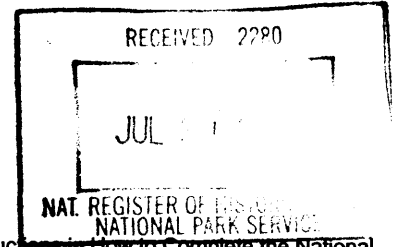

NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The Rudolph-Parke House is located on East First Street in the City of Canton, South Dakota. The house is located in a thriving community, just blocks from the commercial core. The house is surrounded by early 20th century structures, some that have been moved into the neighborhood. The house is an excellent example of a Queen Anne style house.

Architectural Description

The Rudolph-Parke House faces south onto First Street. The house rests upon a cut pink Quartzite foundation laid in even courses above ground. The stone below the surface is uncut and has an irregular course. The two and one-half story massed plan is clad in three inch pine clapboards. The two gables are finished with fish scale and diamond shingles. The house has a wrap around porch which commences at the southwest corner and terminates at the northeast corner.

The façade (south elevation) has a shed roof wrap around porch. There are six Doric columns that support the entire porch roof. At the southwest corner of the porch is a set of steps which lead to the front entrance. Between each of the columns is a set of balusters. Located at the eave of the porch roof are dentil mouldings. At the southwest corner of the first floor is a one-over-one double hung window. The top pane of the window is leaded glass. Adjacent to the window is the main entrance to the house. At the southeast corner of the first floor is a cottage window. The top narrow pane of the cottage window is leaded glass. The second floor has a bay window at the southwest corner. Each of the three windows in the bay is a one-over-one double hung. The bay is covered by a conical roof which is topped with a decorative finial. Also on the second floor is a one-over-one double hung window. In the gable are three small one-over-one double hung windows with the top panes of each window diamond shaped leaded glass. Also in the gable are fish scale shingles and bargeboard in the peak.

The east elevation has the continuation of the wraparound porch on the first floor. At the northeast corner of the first floor are an entrance and a cottage window with the upper pane being leaded glass. The second floor has from the southeast corner: a one-over-one double hung window, an entry door, and two one-over-one windows. The gable has two small one-over-one windows with the top panes of each window diamond shaped leaded glass. Also in the gable are diamond shingles and bargeboard. To the east of this elevation a breezeway which connects to a two-stall gable garage. The breezeway has an entry door. In the peak of the gable are two small one-over-one double hung windows and fishscale shingles.
