

Narrative Description

The Somerset Armory (PU-S-80) is located at 109 Grande Avenue in a residential area of Somerset just outside of the courthouse square. The armory was completed in 1948 and is a large, two-story yellow brick building with one-story wings on either side. The five-bay facade (east elevation) features limestone detailing around the entry and windows, and a thin cornice line; otherwise the building is free of ornamentation. The two one-story wings have little ornamentation except for the limestone sills under the windows and the thin limestone cornice line. The two-story drill hall is located at the rear of the administrative section. The ten-pane metal casement windows on the east elevation are original, but the original three sets of wooden doors were replaced by glass doors and windows in the 1970s. Concrete steps lead up to the entrance, and the building sits on a concrete foundation.

On either side of the building (north and south elevations) are three hexagonal windows located on the second floor - these are original to the building. The windows of the drill hall on the north, south, and west elevations are original to the building. These are large, 32-paned metal-casement windows. On the north elevation, in the basement of the armory, are four garage bays which make up the OMS area. The OMS occupies the entire lower level of the armory.

On the interior of the armory are several original features of the building. The original wooden drill hall floor is intact, as are the wooden bleachers in the balcony overlooking the drill hall. The two sets of double wooden doors leading into the drill hall are original, as are most of the doors in the armory. The majority of these doors also retain their original hardware. Movable wooden bleachers were donated to the armory in 1949, so that they could be used during basketball games. The armory's dedication plaque, listing its date of construction (1948), architects and engineers Frankel & Curtis, and the builder: Wehr Construction Company out of Louisville. The plaque is located in the entrance hall. The Somerset and Elizabethtown armories are identical to each other in design and plan, as they were both designed by the firm of Frankel & Curtis.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The Somerset Armory (PU-S-80) meets criteria A (historic association) and C (type of construction) of the National Register and is a significant representation of the National Guard in Kentucky. The armory meets the registration requirements established for the armory property type because it possesses integrity of location and setting, materials and design, and association with the National Guard. The armory has not been moved, and it remains in its original residential setting. The armory has not been heavily altered, so it retains its integrity of materials and design, and has integrity of association, because it is still owned by the National Guard. The Somerset Armory is significant within the historic context of "Kentucky's National Guard Facilities: 1931-1951."

The Somerset Armory was built during a decade when the National Guard was constructing a large number of armories, and the building served as both a military and community center for Somerset. The armory has retained its original appearance and maintains its integrity of location and setting. The building is recognizable as an armory on both the exterior and the interior.

A military unit has been in Somerset since the late nineteenth century. Men from Somerset are believed to have fought in the Spanish-American War in 1898. National Guardsmen participated in World War I, (France), World War II (South Pacific), and Korea. Infantry, Armor, and Engineer Battalions have all been located in Somerset, with Company C of the 149th Infantry stationed there now. Before the Pulaski County high schools had their own gymnasiums, they used the armory's drill hall/gym for their home basketball games. During tornadoes and snowstorms, people have stayed at the armory. The armory is still used for basketball games, as well as for wedding receptions, auctions, circuses, and trade shows. Since its inception, the armory has served as a home base for the National Guard and as a community gathering place.

Verbal Boundary Description - The parcel designated by the Pulaski County PVA as tax map/parcel #061-7-5-01.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The chosen boundary encompasses the Somerset Armory, related motor pool and parking lot, and front yard, for a total of 1.70 acres, the area historically associated with the Somerset Armory.
