Beach/Knapp Area Form

The Beach/Knapp District is composed of six buildings located on two side streets between the "Adult Entertainment Zone" of lower Washington Street and the Harrison Avenue edge of Chinatown and the Garment District. The buildings reflect the historical development of the area from residential to mixed commercial and light industrial/warehouse uses and are architecturally significant as fine examples of particular building types.

During the 1830's and 40's, the Beach/Knapp area was predominantly residential, and the modest Greek Revival rowhouses at 5 & 7 Knapp (TH-50 and TH-51) survive from this earlier period. Because of the nearby Boston to Albany and Old Colony Railroad terminals, the Washington Street area was also a popular location for hotels. One such hotel, the "Shakespearian Inn" remains at 7-15 Beach Street (TH-47). The other three buildings, 17-23 and 25-29 Beach and 9-23 Knapp (TH-48, TH-49, TH-52) are representative of the light manufacturing activity which gradually moved into the area after the Great Fire of 1872, which resulted in displacement from the city center of more marginal wholesale and light industrial uses, particularly those related to Boston's clothing industry. Little is known about the specific uses of these three buildings except that two were originally owned by Andrew G. Weeks, a partner in a large and prosperous wholesale drug company, and the third was owned by Week's son, Warren P. Weeks, a real estate broker.

The three "loft" buildings are architecturally significant as fine examples of the Victorian Commercial Style. Those at 17-23 Beach (TH-48) and 9-23 Knapp (TH-52) were designed by the nationally known firm of Shepley, Rutan and Coolidge. 9-23 Knapp is particularly indebted to the Richardsonian tradition in its simple massing and multi-story arcades. The remodelled Shakespearian Inn (TH-47) has several architectural features which are unique in the Central Business District, including three 4-story metal oriel windows, elaborate cast iron capitals, and a cast iron plaque of William Shakespeare.

Boundary Justification: The boundary line was drawn around four buildings considered of high architectural quality with 19th century characteristics (7-15, 17-23 and 25-29 Beach Street and 9-23 Knapp Street). In the process 5 and 7 Knapp Street were also included, reflecting the area's earlier nineteenth century residential character,

- TH-47 7-15 Beach Street (Shakespearian Inn) (c. 1885, remodelled 1897 by F. Hartwell) 5-story tan brick Renaissance Revival building with unusual 4-story oriels. Remodelled into "Shakespearian Inn" in 1897.
- TH-48 <u>17-23 Beach Street</u> (1906, Shepley, Rutan & Coolidge) 8-story brick Commercial Style "loft" building.
- TH-49 <u>25-29 Beach Street</u> (1885, Wait and Cutter) 6-story brick Commerical Style "loft" building constructed for light manufacturing use.
- TH-50 <u>5 Knapp Street</u> (c. 1835-39) 3¹/₂-story vernacular brick Greek Revival dwelling raised to 4 stories and given commercial storefront.
- TH-51 7 Knapp Street (c. 1835) 3-story vernacular brick Greek Revival dwelling.
- TH-52 <u>9-23 Knapp Street</u> (1889, Shepley, Rutan & Coolidge) 6-story Romanesque Revival/Commercial Style brick "loft" building.
