The Finnish Congregational Church is a rectangular wooden frame building which has a centrally-located entrance tower on its front elevation. With the exception of the unusual shingled overhanging upper stage of the tower, the building is sheathed in weatherboards and rests on a stone foundation.

Facing west, the three-bay principal elevation is composed of the projecting tower and flanking six-over-six windows on the recessed walls of the nave. Paired four-panel doors open into a vestibule and a narrow oneover-one window is located between this opening and the pyramidal upper stage. Each side of this section of the tower, which overhangs the lower one by about twelve inches, is punctuated by a single six-over-six window. It is capped by a hip roof.

The main body of the church is twenty-six feet by forty feet in dimension and covered by a gable roof with broad overhanging eaves. Each side elevation contains a trio of paired six-over-six windows. There are two windows and a door on the rear wall.

Inside, the building is finished throughout in tongue-and-groove sheathing. The chancel is located within a narrow recessed opening at the east end in front of which is a low curved balustrade with steps at both ends. Doors located at the sides of the chancel lead into a kitchen and dining room (doors at the rear of the chancel are non-functional). A double row of pews separated by a central aisle occupy the nave.

To the south of the church building is the one-story three-bay parsonage. Its gabled facade has a full width hipped roof entry porch. The parsonage is sheathed in weatherboards and has a bay window on the south side elevation and a shed roofed toilet at the rear.

Immediately to the rear of the church is the small gable roofed outhouse and woodshed. The frame building is in a dilapidated condition.

The Finnish Congregational Church and Parsonage in South Thomaston consists of a pair of modest vernacular frame buildings which were erected in 1921 and c. 1925 respectively. It is the first religious edifice built by the Finnish community in Knox County, and it continues to be used by the descendants of the original congregants. The church is significant under criterion A for its association with the ethnic heritage of the Finns. Criteria consideration A also applies by virtue of its religious use.

According to church records, the Finnish Congregational Church was formally organized in 1921. Prior to the erection of the church building, religious services had been held in the St. Georges River schoolhouse by a Finnish pastor, Lauri P. Miettinen. In its May 12, 1921, edition, the <u>Courier Gazette</u> (Rockland) announced the forthcoming building project, noting that the materials had been salvaged from the Booth Brothers Boarding House in Waldoboro. It further stated that:

The building has already been torn down, and the lumber will be shipped by rail the last of this week. The new church will be 26X40 feet, seating about 50 persons, and will cost between \$1,500 and \$2,000. Aid is being given by the Congregational Missionary Society. It will be ready for occupancy late in the fall.

The adjacent one-story bungalow style parsonage was built in the late 1920s.

Although a scholarly study of the Finnish immigration to Maine has not been conducted, census figures indicate that the influx of foreign born Finns into Maine between 1900 and 1920 generally followed national trends, although proportionally their numbers in this state grew at a more rapid rate. The statistical analyses of the census show that the Finnish population in Maine grew from 179 persons in 1900 to 1,393 in 1920. (There was no separate breakdown for persons born in Finland in the 1890 analysis, but their numbers were smaller simply because the "all other" category of ethnicity for Maine was 156.) By comparison, the population nationally in the period grew from 54,054 to 149,824. In 1910, slightly more than 70% of the Finnish population was concentrated in Knox and Oxford, 51% of whom resided in Knox. The settlement pattern was more disbursed a decade later, but these two areas still accounted for one-half of the total number.

The Finns in Knox County appear to have settled primarily in the areas of Long Cove, South Thomaston, Waldoboro, and Warren. Farming was probably the principal occupation for most of these people, although others were employed at nearby granite quarries. The <u>Courier-Gazette</u> article mentions that the first farm taken up by a Finnish family along the St. George Road had occurred twenty-five years earlier (1896). Studies of the Finnish immigration nationally underscore the fact that although employed initially

in the relatively high wage extraction industries (principally the iron mines of the Midwest), the goal of many Finns was to acquire a farm. It is likely that this pattern was repeated in Maine where the existence of numerous abandoned farms made this goal readily achievable. However, further investigation needs to be carried out to verify this hypothesis.

The establishment of a Finnish Congregational Church by the immigrant community in South Thomaston mirrors the pattern in Massachusetts and New York where the missionary activity of the American Congregational Church had focussed on this ethnic group. Elsewhere in the country, the Finns were associated with separatist Lutheran congregations and the Methodists.
