7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Alvah A. Heald House occupies a prominent corner location on Cascade Street (State Highway 35) two blocks north of the community's commercial district. As one of only two nineteenth century brick residential structures in town and as an example of a relatively "prosperous" Italianate style design, the house is an architectural landmark in this community of 1,000 people.

The Heald House is a two-story brick structure covered by a low-pitched hipped roof broken by a central brick chimney. The house features a side hall entrance with transom and side lights protected by a balustraded entry portico; projecting eaves supported by decorative brackets; and a three-sided bay window on the west facade. All windows are two-over-two double-hung sash windows with stone sills and segmental brick window heads.

A $1\frac{1}{2}$ story brick section covered by a truncated hipped roof is attached to the rear of the rectangular shaped structure.

Alterations include a garage door and service entrance cut into the west facade of the rear section, and an enclosed porch added to the southeast corner (not visible from the street). The structure possesses good design integrity.

The well maintained interior contains a marble fireplace, curving wood stairways with hand rails apparently of walnut, and coffin corner at the top of the stairway.

Among other original features, retained or replicated, is a wood shingled roof, recently completed. The wood frame window sash all appear to be original as well. The small front porch, while sympathetic in scale and materials may not be original to the design of the house.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Period of significance: 1879-1892

The Alvah A. Heald House is significant for its association with one of Osceola's leading businessmen and a respected government official. Built in 1879-80, the brick Italianate structure is also significant as a local architectural landmark associated with Osceola's once prominent position as a prosperous river community during the period prior to the arrival of the railroad (1887).

During the late 1870s and early 1880s, Osceola was the leading center of economic and political activity in Polk County. It was the county's largest community (population 311 in 1880), the seat of county government, and the commercial center for a rapidly developing agricultural hinterland. In 1880, 3,539 people, over 1/3 of Polk County's population, resided in the county's three southwestern townships (Osceola, Farmington, and Alden).

A. A. Heald settled in Polk County in 1859, and moved to Osceola in 1875 to open a dry goods store. From his arrival until the first decade of the twentieth century, Heald was a prominent member of Osceola's business community. In addition to operating the dry goods store from 1875 to 1892, he engaged in a number of business ventures including a partnership in a lumber business, the operation of a roller skating rink, and ownership of a large warehouse on the levee.

Heald was also a respected government official and an influential figure in the Polk County Republican Party. He served in several public capacities: County Treasurer (1866-70); Receiver of the U.S. Land Office in St. Croix Falls (1885-88); President of the Village of Osceola (1889-90); members of the County Board of Supervisors (1891-92); Clerk of the Circuit Court (1893-96); and Justice of the Peace (1897-1918). He also served as chairman of the Polk County Republican Central Committee for several years during the 1870s.

At the time of his death in October 1920, at the age of 93, the <u>Osceola Sun</u> declared that the county had lost "one of its strongest men in its history...(who) has taken part in almost every phase of the development of Polk County."

Heald built the Italianate style house for \$3,500. When nearly completed, the <u>Polk County Press</u> informed its readers that the Heald House was a "palace" and "by far the finest and most costly home in town." Heald sold the house in 1892 (the same year he closed his dry goods business) and moved to a farm on the outskirts of town. Both the structures' Italianate design and brick construction are unique for Osceola, a community characterized by simple frame residential structures.

(The community's only other remaining 19th century, brick residence has been recently covered in stucco.)


