#### Description:

The Benjamin Helm House is a two-story brick residence constructed ca. 1816. The house was originally built in a Federal style, central passage, single pile plan. It originally had one-story wings on the east and west but these have been removed. Original features include the Flemish bond exterior, window jack arching and a second story door with an elliptical fanlight. The first floor doorway on the main facade was altered ca. 1910 into a Colonial Revival appearance with two-light sidleights. The present two-story porch was added ca. 1960 with large Doric columns. At the rear of the house are numerous two-story brick additions added in the late 19th century. Also at the rear is an attached ca. 1960 garage. The interior was inaccessible. There are no outbuildings.

Statement of Significance:

The Benjamin Helm House is notable for its association with Benjamin Helm, an important early settler of Elizabethtown. Helm came to Hardin County in 1780 and helped with the formation Elizabethtown. He made the first survey of the town and was one of the first Trustees. He was appointed Hardin County Clerk in 1800 and was also a clerk of the Circuit Court. During these years he also helped to found and serve on the board of the Hardin Academy. Helm served in the War of 1812 rising to the rank of Major but seeing no significant action. After the war Helm became actively involved in local business becoming quite wealthy. Around 1816 this large two-story brick residence was constructed for Helm which originally featured attached one-story wings. Helm was appointed director of the Union bank in 1818 and continued to be active in business until his death in 1858. Under later owners the house was remodeled several times and can longer be considered significant under criterion C.
