Beginning at Point A, at the intersection of the eastern edge of the main farm road and the fence defining the northern extent of the barn-associated lot, 300 ft. eastward along fence to intersection with another fence at B; 230 ft. southward to C; 300 ft. westward along a fence and a line corresponding to an extention of the fence to the eastern edge of the main farm drive at D; 230 ft. northward along said edge of said drive to point of origin.

The boundaries were drawn to include the barn and its setting of adjacent feed lots as defined by fences. The area also includes a concrete block milking parlor, a corrugated metal shed, and a frame board-and-batten building, all of which, though modern, relate directly to the current operation of the barn. Although they are non-contributing, these buildings could not be excluded from the boundaries without disrupting the relationship of the barn to the barn lot.

45. Description and House Plan:

Octagonal frame barn. Ground floor now altered beyond interpretation. Loft area well preserved. Inner octagon of posts provides intermediate support for a common-rafter roof. Cupola in center carried on a compression ring. Evidence of ca. 9 foot-wide aisle includes change in loft floor jevel and beams spanning its location to carry posts above which would have impeded movement through it (see plan). Similar in several respects to dairy barns reported in New York State, showing influence of late nineteenth-century publications of agricultural societies and promoters of octagonal barns as economical and efficient forms to build and operate.^{*} It may have had a combination of a central plan with a transverse aisle. Scalloped vergeboards around barn above vertical-board siding on barn and central cupola. Asphalt shingle roof. Rectangular frame dairy barn addition to north with connected silos. Concrete block dairy barn extension to west.
