The Dutch Hollow Wine Cellars, fronted by triplet brick arches which excite the curiosity of passersby, are the last known remnants of a once thriving industry in West Virginia, and occupy land once owned by George Washington. In 1876 the resources of the State included wine manufacture because the summer suns were long and warm enough and the State well located within the thermometric zone in which grapes mature. The largest crop came from Ohio County, which has approximately 700 acres of grapes from a State-wide total of around 900 acres. In 1874 the Ohio County crop was valued at \$100,000, with shipments to Pittsburgh, New York, Boston, and Omaha. By 1904, the industry was almost non-existent as only one "vinous liquor establishment" was listed in the entire state.

The hundred-acre tract on which the wine cellars now stand was originally part of a 2,666 acre tract which was surveyed for George Washington in 1774 by Samuel Lewis. The land became part of Washington's western lands in 1784 by a patent issued to the, then, Colonel George Washington.

The name of the Friend family first became involved with the property in 1835 when Thomas R. Friend bought the property from the Cabells. He then sold it to his father Joseph Friend but re-purchased it again in 1855.

The date of construction of the wine cellars is not known for certain. They were probably built around 1855. From a newspaper article in 1859, it is certain that Thomas Friend was already selling "native wines" commercially.

The "big blue" grapes, grown all around the hollow, were reportedly picked, pressed, set in the sun to ferment, and aged in the cool cellars. After Proper aging, the wine was hauled by oxcart to Dunbar and then shipped to Cincinnati by steamboat.

The variety of grapes grown at Dutch Hollow is not known, but Maury and Fontaine report that, "the vineyards existing in Kanawha, in 1870, were principally Catawba but proved so unreliable that the owners have since uprooted them and are now planting Concord and Seedling."

8. Friend remained a resident of Kanawha County until the outbreak of the Civil War. A dedicated Confederate, he left in July of 1861 when Federal troops entered the County. It was soon after his departure, for southern Virginia, that the cellars and the vineyard were neglected.

It probably became impractical to try to continue producing wine during the hardship of the Civil War. A legal suit was filed against the Friends on the Basis that they were non-residents. Thomas Friend died before the case was completed, but the suit and the property were finally lost by his heirs. Finally in 1874 the property was auctioned to the highest bidder by the County Court.
