DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Verbena is a small unincorporated town located on rolling hills which slope down to the banks of Chestnut Creek. Included in the district boundaries are 57 structures, most of which date from the late 19th century. With only five exceptions the buildings are of frame construction and most are only 1 story in height.

The majority of the structures are unpretentious dwellings based on traditional house forms found in the state; the dogtrot, saddlebag, shotgun, single pen cabin, and the pyramidal roof house. A number of structures, most notably the Methodist Parsonage (27), are modest Victorian homes with small amounts of ornamentation. Several structures; the Gibson House (37), the two churches (1 & 48), the Verbena Academy (31), the Barrett-Shepard House (13) and the Baldwin House (20) are notable exceptions.

The major concentration of structures is along Cooper Street. Several commercial structures are located at the intersection of Cooper and U.S. 31, while the remainder of the structures are scattered or grouped along the roads leading to the town.

All of the houses along Cooper, the only paved street in town, are occupied and well maintained, while most of those along Montgomery Avenue have been abandoned or are in disrepair.

The town has escaped modern intrusion to a remarkable extent. Out of the 57 structures only three could be classified as real intrusions and are located along U.S. 31. They are: Johnsons Grocery store (22), the Standard Station (21), and the Verbena Post Office (16). The remaining buildings constructed after 1920 reflect the scale, materials and in many cases the traditional forms of the earlier structures.



STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

8 SIGNIFICANCE

Verbena is one of the few remaining small towns in the state which has retained most of its rural, late 19th century quality. The initial establishment of the community was brought about by the North-South Railroad passing through the area and the opening of a large saw mill in the vicinity, but in large part the town owes its existence to the yellow fever epidemics of the late 19th century. During the 1870's, 1880's and 1890's, considerable numbers of Black Belt families summered in the town and many finding the location and climate to their liking stayed on as permanent residents.

The earliest known settler in the area was Peter Cooper who obtained a large tract of land in the 1830's. Cooper operated a large plantation, a small saw mill, a grist mill and a cotton gin. Next came Captain John Norton, an Alabama Riverboat Captain, seeking to cure his tuberculosis, as later did the Georgia Poet Sidney Lanier. The North-South Railroad was completed in 1870 and shortly there after the Pratt Saw Mill opened its doors.

In 1873 when Montgomery suffered a severe epidemic of yellow fever, most of the inhabitants of the town fled, many of the prominent families coming to Verbena located 450' above sea level and only 32 miles north of the city. Many of the families constructed summer homes in the area and in the late 1870's a hotel was constructed to keep up with the demands of the summer visitors. During this period two churches were constructed, a number of summer rental cottages built and several stores opened.

One of the earliest families to build a permanent home, was the Gibson family. Major Joseph Carr Gibson, for several years the owner-editor of the Montgomery Daily Mail and a brother-in-law of Sidney Lanier, moved to Verbena in 1875 and constructed the finest house in the village.

When in the early 1880's the first hotel was demolished in a fire, a stock company was organized to build a second hotel, the Clifton House, which was completed in 1882. A few years later a private school was organized for the growing number of permanent residents.

The town reached its peak of popularity as a fashionable summer resort in the late 1880's when a summer staye in Verbena was considered a must by many of Montgomery's most prominent families. By 1900, when yellow fever was no longer a threat, the town had a izable year-round population, two churches, several stores and a school. Its popularity is a resort began to fade and in 1922 when the Clifton House Hotel burned, it was not eplaced. During this time the town experienced a small boom due to the construction of earby Mitchell Dam and several rental houses were built (numbers 7-12). At present the own is composed of permanent residents, many of whom commute to Montgomery. The town #self serves as the religious and educational center for the five neighboring communities




