DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located on its original site at the corner of California and Gordon Avenues in Newlands Heights (see map), the William J. Graham house is situated on two lots, measuring 100 feet by about 140 feet, overall. The structure is 82 feet long and 30 feet wide, plus an attached one-car garage about 15 feet long. The tudor revival house is constructed of brick with half-timbered stucco gables (two on the north, three on the west and one on the south). The original wood shingle roof, leaded windows and an eyebrow window on the Gordon Avenue facade all are intact. Two brick chimneys punctuate the roofline. The house was designed by George A. Shastey (Architect-Designer) for Graham and his wife who occupied the structure until they died there in 1965 and 1968, respectively. The original building plans, dated September 1, 1927, are available. Baseboards, casings and other moldings are intact in the original portions of the ground floor.

The Graham's added a gable cover over a portion of the L-shaped front porch to provide cover for the entrance, plus the small garage at the rear. Another gable covering the east end of the front porch, housing a bathroom-dressing room addition, was constructed in 1971 (plans are available) for Robert Leland, who bought the house and its contents from the Graham estate in 1969 and still occupies it as a residence and law office. All three additions match the original style and materials, including the decorative rafter detail.

Between 1968 and 1971, the kitchen was relocated to occupy a back porch and laundry room; all the original glass-front and other cabinets were preserved. A bathroom also was added in part of the laundry room. The two sets of original bathroom fixtures, plus some decorative tile appointments, have been incorporated into the present bathrooms. A pantry and breakfast room were combined into a study. The front room contains the original tile-faced fireplace (about 78" wide and 49" high to the mantel, opening 41" wide by 28" high). The fireplace was never used until 1969; it was stuffed with 1929 newspapers. Most of the original furnishing have been retained.

The full attic is in the process of being converted to useable space so that more ground floor rooms can be used for law offices. An oak staircase, especially designed to be appropriate to the house, provides attic access, occupying the former hall to the bedrooms. The attic construction has not altered the three facades which are visible from the streets*, five flush skylight windows constitute the only changes to the fourth facade, which faces the private yard.

The grounds were attractively landscaped by the Grahams. The original plantings are almost all intact, including mature trees (blue spruce, norway maple, silver maples), many interesting shrubs, smaller trees, roses, vines and other perennials. One 5' x 8' wooden, garden-tool house, constructed about 1977, occupies the SE corner of the lot, about 45 feet from the house.

8 SIGNIFICANCE

The house at 548 California Avenue is mainly significant because it was built for and occupied nearly 40 years by William J. Graham, a major figure in the history of Nevada gaming, who also was prominent in other colorful aspects of 20th century Nevada history. The tudor revival house is noteworthy for its solid construction, excellent craftsman-ship and unusually good state of preservation, as well.

Graham's gaming career began at age 18 in Tonopah, were he ran the Big Casino Club. In 1922, he and lifelong partner James McKay bought and operated "The Willows" in Reno, which became nationally known as a gathering place for the divorce colony of the time. Later, Graham and McKay established the famous Bank Club at Center and Douglas Alley in downtown Reno. They also owned the Fordonia Building at East Second and Center Streets in Reno which housed the Club Fortune, plus the headquarters for both the Republican and the Democratic parties. Graham is said to have had influence with powerful politicians, including Senator McCarran, Governors Pittman and Russell and Reno Mayor Edwin E. Roberts.

The notorious Stockade ("cribs") red light district was built in 1923 by the Riverside Securities Company, of which Graham and McKay were the principal stockholders. They leased the site from George Wingfield's Riverside Mill Company for this venture, despite the fact that six months earlier the Reno City Council had enacted an anti-prostitution law. By the end of the year, the law had been liberalized and the Stockade began a thriving business which continued until World War II, even after 1938 when Graham and McKay were finally (after three tries) convicted of mail fraud. Senator McCarran obtained a full pardon for Graham from President Harry Truman.

Graham and McKay also were prominent bootleggers in northwestern Nevada and they promoted famous prizefights, including the 1931 Baer-Uzcudun Reno fight, in partnership with Jack Dempsey.

Remnants of many aspects of Graham's activities were still in the house when the Leland's acquired it: a champagne glass etched "The Willows", bootleg liquor and the makings, sawed-off shotgun holsters, photographs of prizefights and racehorses, marked ballots (with rubber stamp) for the 1926 general election, cards suspiciously arranged by face value rather than in decks, and many other items.

No information was found on George A. Schastey, the architect.
