Graves estates, this house, like many others incorporated on that family's large holdin Scott County, has been allowed to deteriorate. The weatherboarde house for many years has been used for the storage of hay. In spite of this use or abuse of residential property, the log struct which was the home of Fielding Bradford at the time of his death, which may have been his home for the duration of his life in Scott County, is in relatively good shape. It recently was purchased from Graves', heirs by a couple who are considering restoration and who 								
 The house sits atop a knoll overlooking McCracken Run. It is located between the Long Lick Pike, known as Reddings Well Road when the Bradfords were living, and U.S. 25, known then as the Dry Ridge Road The central chimney of stone protrudes from the one-and-one-half stor structure, and sheds have been affixed at both sides and enclosed. The foundation is of stone, and there is a basement. A portion of very early wide beaded weatherboarding can be discerned on the southwest corner of the house. A room in the northwest corner has beaded beams and ceiling hoards. The remaining mantel is set in the wall with only the shelf extending beyond the wall.

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John and Fielding Bradford were the sons of Daniel Bradford of Fauquier County, Virginia. In 1779, Daniel Bradford and his son, John, surveyed land claims in the area. Among the 6,000 acres claimed by the Bradfords were two 1,000 acre grants in Scott County. At least four of Daniel Bradford's eleven children settled on these tracts.

Fielding and John Bradford founded the Kentucky Gazette, the first newspaper west of the Alleghenies. They published their first edition in Lexington, Kentucky on August 11, 1787. The early newspapers played an important role in the history of Kentucky and the development of the West. They knit together the scattered communities of literate pioneers, molded their opinions, informed them of world happenings and gave them a vehicle for verbal expression. They led to a high organization of political development and statehood.

Both of the founders of the Kentucky Gazette served important functions in their communities. According to J. Winston Coleman, Jr., John Bradford also published the first volume of a literary nature to be published in Kentucky. "In addition to being a self-taught printer and publisher, John Bradford was a mathmetician and a man of considerable mechanical ability. He was one of the organizers of the Lexington Library, founded in 1795, and served as one of its trustees."

Fielding Bradford bought the type for the newspaper in Pittsburgh in the spring of 1787. In 1937, G. Glenn Cliff wrote in The Kentucky Press that "Fielding Bradford's contribution to early numbers of the Gazette cannot be passed over lightly... he not only officiated at its birth, but made the long and dangerous trip to Pittsburgh for the crude equipment necessary for such a venture." Fielding was 20 years old when the first edition was printed. He left the Gazette the next spring (1788), married Eleanor Smith Barbee and probably shortly after that moved to Scott County. Young Bradford immediately became a leader in the Scott County community. He was elected to the State House of Representatives in 1802, 1803, 1808, 1809 and 1811. He was a gentleman justice on the county court, quartermaster of Trotter's first regiment and father of a productive group of children. (See continuation sheet)
