

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The E.W. Cannon House and Store are located at 612 West Home Avenue in Hartsville. This house is representative of residences in Hartsville associated with the community's industrial, commercial, and civic leaders.

This two-story residence is of frame construction with weatherboard siding. It has a rectangular plan, lateral gable roof, and two interior ridge brick chimneys with corbeled caps. The symmetrical three-bay facade has paired four-over-four double-hung-sash windows with shutters. The central entry has an arched-panel door, simple surround with sidelights and transom. A one-story, hip roof porch extends across the full facade. It features chamfered posts, sawn brackets, a pendant frieze, and turned balustrade. The house has a boxed cornice with returns and corner pilasters. The side elevations have polygonal bay windows.

The one-story gable roof rear wing was constructed c. 1840 and was incorporated into the house when built c. 1880.

The store is located to the rear of the house. Constructed c. 1870, it is an excellent example of a country store. It is one-and-one-half stories with a rectangular plan and gable roof. The construction is hand-hewn heavy timber frame with log joists and it sits on pole piers. The facade is three-bay with a central entry. The windows are shuttered with no sash and a loft window is located in the center of the gable. A secondary entry and loft window are located at the rear elevation. Side elevations have no openings.

The property also includes a frame garage (c. 1930) and a frame smokehouse (c. 1880-1900).

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The E.W. Cannon House and Store are significant as representative examples of the residential and commercial development of Hartsville prior to 1890 and for their association with Elihu W. Cannon (1841-1911), prominent Hartsville farmer and Darlington County politician.

The house has architectural integrity from c. 1880, and incorporates a small c. 1840 residence built for Isham Linton. In 1856 the original house was sold to D. Sidney Law, and at Law's death in 1864 his stepson, Elihu W. Cannon, acquired the property. Linton's house was described in 1911 as "the back part of the present residence of E.W. Cannon, a little pink-painted house of one story, containing four or five rooms." Cannon substantially altered and enlarged the house c. 1880, and lived here until his death in 1911. During the Civil War he served as a lieutenant in the "Hartsville Light Infantry," a local Confederate company in the 9th (later 6th) South Carolina Infantry. He was temporarily in command of the company when he was severely wounded in 1862, requiring the amoutation of his right leg and his discharge from Confederate service. Cannon, a farmer, entered local politics soon after the war and was prominent throughout the 1870s and 1880s. During Reconstruction he organized and served as captain of the "Hartsville Light Dragoons," a company of "Red Shirts" who opposed the Federal military occupation of South Carolina and the policies which gave civil rights to freedmen. He served as jury commissioner 1876-1878, in the South Carolina House of Representatives 1878-1882 and again 1888-1890, and as treasurer of Darlington County from 1881 to 1884. Cannon was also a postwar member of the Hartsville Farmer's Club, which had been established in 1859 and which was reorganized for a short time during Reconstruction. (1)

The store, built c. 1870, also served as a post office from 1873 to 1878, when Cannon was Hartsville's postmaster. It is an excellent example of a country store, and is listed as one of five "general merchandise" stores in Hartsville in the 1880-81 <u>South Carolina State Gazetteer and Business Directory</u>.
