#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Ricketts House is located in a bend of Beasely Lane which runs off Highway 55, between New Castle and Campbellsburg. Ten acres of farmland surround the residence.

This fine house is a five-bay, one-and-a-half story structure with parapet end chimneys. The brick is laid in Flemish bond in the front and common on the sides and back. A narrow boxed cornice with molding below extends across the front of the house. There is evidence that a porch originally spanned the center three bays of the facade, but it was removed at an unknown date (see photo 1). Around 1900 a frame lean-to was added across the back.

The front entrance in the center bay has a large transom with a jack arch above. All the windows have six-over-six panersash; jack arches, and wooden sills. Two openings are centered between the chimneys in the end walls on both the first and second floors.

The layout of the house is unusual in that it is based on the hall and parlor plan, and is two rooms deep, instead of one. The back rooms are the same proportions as those of the front. The main entrance opens onto the large east room with a flight of stairs with a quarter turn rising along the west wall. A second enclosed corner staircase is located in the southwest corner of the rear east room (see sketch of the floor plan).

Each room on the first floor has a fireplace with a simple Greek Revival mantel composed of a plain shelf, and a frieze with a cyma reverse molding. Plain pilasters support the frieze. The fireplaces are faced with brick and have segmental arched openings (see photo 3). A built-in poplar cupboard is located to the left of the fireplace in the east front room, and to the right of the fireplace in the east rear room. High baseboards extend around all the rooms. It appears that the woodwork in the house was changed during the Greek Revival period. A piece of earlier beaded baseboard was discovered in the closet underneath the front stairs.

There are three rooms on the second floor; two small rooms on the east side and one large room on the west. No fireplace openings are found upstairs.

Located immediately behind the house to the south is a one-room outbuilding constructed of field stone laid in random courses. A large exterior stone chimney is placed at the east end, while the entrance is in the west wall. The roof of the structure has completely deteriorated. Also near the house is the remains of an ice house and the family cemetery.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Ricketts House, located between New Castle, the county seat, and Campbellsburg, was built in the 1830s by Robert Wilson Ricketts, a Baptist minister. In 1856 the farm was inherited by Ricketts' son, Robert Luther, a prominent businessman and former County sheriff. The house has several distinctive features including parapet end chimneys and a hall and parlor floor plan, uncommon in Kentucky, in a double pile structure.

Robert W. Ricketts (1794-1856), originally from Maryland, moved with his parents to Jessamine County in 1797. After attending the local schools he became a gunsmith by which trade he acquired a sizable property. In 1815 he married Sally W. Thomas. Shortly after his marriage he was converted and baptized into the Baptist Church.

In 1830 he moved with his family to New Castle in Henry County. Three years later he was licensed to preach and ordained to the ministry. Ricketts was described as "a good preacher, for that day, a man of strong convictions, and a bold, persistant executor of his purposes" (Spencer, p. 529).

During the 1830s there was a great discussion within the Sulphur Fork Association concerning missions. Ricketts was opposed to the missions of the time and became the leader of the antimissionary party in the association. The disagreement led to a schism and in 1840 the Mount Pleasant Association was formed, with Ricketts as moderator. He held this position until his death in 1856.

In 1834 Ricketts purchased the farm, on which the house was built, from Robert Lankford. It is believed that the house was built shortly afterwards. Several unusual features characterize the Ricketts House. Parapet end chimney's are rarely found in Kentucky residences, although Casa Blanca, a similar example, was found along the Kentucky River in Henry County (see photo 5). (Casa Blanca, built c. 1847, was constructed by Adjutant General Charles E. Marshall, brother of Humphrey Marshall, and grandson of Chief John Marshall. The house was destroyed by fire in the 1960s.) The layout of the Ricketts House is based on the hall and parlor plan, found in a number of early houses around the State. In this case the plan is unusual, because it is found in a double pile house. Only a few other structures with similar layouts have been discovered in Hart County which is located in west central Kentucky.

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At the time of Ricketts' death in 1856 the property was left to his son, Robert Luther, although his widow, Sally, continued to live there until her death in 1889. Robert L. Ricketts was a successful businessman and also served two terms as the Henry County Sheriff beginning in 1872. In 1899 Ricketts', daughter and son-in-law, Mary and Oscar Orem, purchased the house and land and held it until 1905, when it was sold outside of the family. It was just recently purchased by the Orem's granddaughter, who plans to restore the house and outbuildings.






