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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Mentzer House, located on a corner lot in a Marion residential neighborhood, is a well-preserved example of the Second Empire style, popular in Iowa and the nation at large from the Civil War era until almost the end of the nineteenth century. Prominent Marion businessman Joseph P. Mentzer built this attractive red brick edifice in 1868. It consists of a two-and-one-half story, squarish main block, a one-andone-half story rear wing, and a one-story edifice attached to the wing. The structure rests on stone foundations over a partially raised basement and features a continuous stone belt course. Windows are generally of the multipaned wood sash variety and are set in arched brick surrounds that feature carved stone hood moulds.

In addition to contrasting stone and brickwork and window treatments, exterior ornamentation is provided by elaborately carved brackets along the roofline under the paneled frieze boards. The edifice is capped with a mansard roof which originally was covered with wood shingles, but is presently covered with composition ones. The roof of the main block is pierced by pedimented dormers while the rear wing features flat roofed ones.

Except for the addition of an outside stairway to the attic area and an open porch, the house appears to have undergone little exterior alteration. The one-story attachment to the rear wing which presently serves as a garage was not erected in 1868, but it appears to be of late nineteenth or early twentieth century vintage.

Inside, the house follows a side hall plan with a living room, dining room, kitchen, and two bedrooms on the first floor; two bedrooms, kitchen, and living room on the second floor: and a kitchen, living room, and bedroom on the third or attic level area. Because of remodeling over the years and conversion to multi-family occupancy, much of the house's original interior fabric has been destroyed or simply covered up. Some features like marble fireplaces and woodwork remain however. At present, the house contains three apartments, but the owner is considering converting it to single family use at some later date.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Mentzer House is not only an outstanding example of nineteenth century architecture, but it illustrates the tenacity of the agrarian myth among late nineteenth century Iowa businessmen. Its builder Joseph P. Mentzer moved to Iowa in territorial days from Ohio. In the early 1840's he became a merchant in Marion, and in 1846 he formed a partnership with Henry H. Welch in that town. Mentzer soon became one of Marion's leading and most prosperous businessmen, and when the National Bank was organized in 1863, he was selected as its first president. In 1865 he and Welch decided to dissolve their partnership and close out their business operations.

Although Mentzer continued to engage in occasional business endeavors through his sons, he gave increasing attention to a 170 acre farm on the edge of Marion that he had purchased around the time he dissolved his partnership with Welch. Three years after retiring from business, Mentzer erected a home in the Second Empire Style on this farm and spent most of his remaining years supervising his agricultural operations. The house and farm remained in the Mentzer family for many years, and the house itself was occupied by his descendants until the 1930's.

Lot 1, Bullis' First Addition to the City of Marion, Linn County, Iowa excepting therefrom:

The east 70 feet being measured along the South line and also excepting therefrom: All that part of said Lot 1 lying North of the following described line and adjacent to Third Avenue: Commencing at a point 76.0 feet East of the NW corner of said Lot 1; thence SE along an 89.5 radius curve, tangent to the North line of said Lot 1, a distance of 64.0 feet; thence South 41' East on a line tangent to the preceding curve, a distance of 42.7 feet; thence East 11.0 feet to the NE corner of said Lot 1.
